FORD GETS CAR THAT WON FAME

Manufacturer Will Own Famous "Old 999" Which Initiated Oldfield

Henry Ford is soon to be the proud possessor of "Old 999" the gasoline speed wagon in which Barney Oldfield won his first race and the first automobile to travel over a circular mile track in less than 60 seconds.

This is the word brought back from Portland Wednesday by J. W. Harrison, Ford sales manager of the Valley Motor company. Mr. Harrison saw the veteran old speed vehicle at the sales rooms of the William Hughson Automobile company. Ford agents and was informed that the old relic of the day of flat track racing is soon to be shipped to San Francisco for further exhibition and thence east to become the property of the head of the Ford Motor company.

Just why Mr. Ford should be proud to be rated the owner of "Old 999" can be better understood when it is known that he was the designer of the veteran machine, which was resurrected recently from the chaos of a Los Angeles junk yard.

"Old 999" was the forerunner of the highly perfected Ford car of today, as was the machine which first started both Ford and Oldfield on the road to fame in motordom. It was constructed 18 years by Ford as his entry on the first auto race ever held in Detroit and took its place in history as it passed over the finish line leading the field. Oldfield piloted the car in this first race and continued to do so for the following two years, during which time he established the record of covering a circular mile on a flat track in less than a minute.

While plainly demonstrating the great strides which have been made in the development when compared with the automobile of today "Old

999" which still runs, gives evidence of the birth of the ideas which still predominate in the design of successful cars. A timer identical to that found on the Ford cars of today is a part of the power plant of the veteran speeder and many other

parts are the same in the way of their working idea, although the design has in most cases been improved upon. In the place of the present day steel frame, "Old 999" was made lighter by the use of wood, and the tires mounted on wire wheels, measured 37 x 5 inches.

The highly standardized lubricating system now in use were not thought of when the old racer was built. "Old 999" is minus a crank case for the old reservoir, large oil cups fitting on to the different bearings which had to be turned down every fifty to seventy-five miles, to care for the lubrication.

The differential systems also were unthought of. The old racer covered its fast miles and negotiated the sharp curves without a differential. The same principle of rear axles was used as are found on locomotives, the tires having to stand the strain of one wheel traveling faster than the other.

Instead of the radiator holding water, it was used merely for cooling as it passed through the tube, a tank directly behind the motor being used to contain the water, from which it would go through the motor, passing into the radiator and back.

A straight bar served as the steering apparatus in "Old 999's" time, and two upright projections serving as hand grips for the driver.
