"Home, Sweet Home" a Mockery In the Polyglot Boarding House

Camps Which Shelter Hundreds of Thousands of Wandering Workers Present National Problem Which Interchurch World Movement Is Seeking to Solve.



DOTTING the farmlands of the Middle Atlantic States are the homes that are not homes. They stand beside fields and orchards. Lights begin to shine in their blank windows, and voices to be heard in their drab interiors as the year ripens to the fall and the crops are ready to be picked for the canneries. Vacant and desolate through the greater part of the year, they give shelter to families all through harvest time.

They are "bunk-houses" and "camps" of the fruit pickers, of the immigrant families of wandering workers who are here for a season because work is here. They are a sort of polyglot boarding house, where "Home Sweet Home" is a mockery.

Home, for these wandering workers who can have no home, often means a long, two-story tenement house, crowded with human beings. Family after family goes into them on the "moving-in-day" before the harvest begins until all the laborers are housed.

Kitchen, dining room, sitting room and bed rooms,—those units

that make up a home for most families—are unknown in these rough buildings. The house is by turns kitchen, dining room, sitting room and bedroom. Men, women and children find their sleeping quarters where they may. Privacy is a luxury unheard-of. Household conveniences as the housewife knows them do not exist. Sanitary provisions are almost entirely lacking.

Sometimes "home" is a long one-story bunk-house, a mere shack, with every room opening out of doors. Sometimes—at worst—it is the loft of a barn, where a number of families live without partitions to divide their sleeping quarters. Sometimes the approach to "home" is nearer; a well built house near the residence of the fruit grower; with a second story holding two or three men to a room and a first being used for dining room and kitchen. War has fact to the condition that has modified, to a degree, the housing conditions of the wandering workers.

Yet the homes that are not homes are there. A study of the

conditions is being made by the Interchurch World Movement, which seeks to lay before the Protestant Churches of America the facts and figures of this problem, and to bring about their closer co-operation in its solution.

New York state, the Interchurch World Movement Survey has found, requires 500 fruit and vegetable pickers' camps. And every harvest time in the canneries districts, 23,000 workers must be housed in four states alone—New York, New Jersey, Maryland and Delaware.

These are general estimates. The survey is planned to study every district in detail, to go behind the statistics, to find out the conditions that have caused it. And the purpose is to show concretely what must be done if the wandering workers of the canneries fields are to have homes that are truly homes.

PRESIDENT REPLIES TO TURKISH NOTE

would not seem possible to ignore. It was the often-expressed intention of the allies that the anomaly of the Turks in Europe should cease and that not be believed that the feeling of the Mohammedan people who not only witnessed the defeat of the Turkish power without protest, but even materially assisted in the defeat, will now so resent the expulsion of the Turkish government as to make a complete reversal of policy on the part of the great powers desirable or necessary.

Want South Boundary Changed
"As to the line given as the southern frontier of Turkey, it is assumed that that is the boundary to be the ethnological frontier of the Arab people, in which case, it is suggested, certain rectifications would seem necessary. If, however, other considerations entered into the choice of this line, this government would appreciate being furnished with the arguments dictating such a choice."

"The government of the United States notes with pleasure that provision is made for Russian representation on the international council, which it is proposed shall be established for the government of Constantinople and the straits. This government and control of Constantinople and the straits can have any elements of permanency unless the vital interests of Russia in those problems are carefully provided for and protected, and unless it is understood that Russia, when it has a government recognized by the civ-

ilized world, may assert its right to be heard in regard to the decisions now made.

Russia Must Join.
"It is noted with pleasure that the questions of passage of warships and the regime of the straits in war time are still under advisement. As this government is convinced that no final decision should or can be made without the consent of Russia."

"As for Thrace, it would seem right that that part of East Thrace which is outside of the zone reserved for Constantinople should become part of the kingdom of Greece, with the exception of the northern part of that province. As this, the northern part, is clearly Bulgarian in population, justice and fair dealing demand that the cities of Adrianople and Kirk Kilisseh and the surrounding territory should become part of Bulgaria. It is only the claim of Bulgaria worthy of most serious consideration on ethnic and historical grounds, but it would also mean that Bulgaria is entitled to have its claim to this territory favorably considered. In view of its having been compelled to surrender purely Bulgarian territory and many thousands of Bulgars on its western boundary on no other grounds than the rather doubtful grounds of securing a strategic frontier for Serbia."

Pleads Sea-Coast for Armenia.
"In connection with the proposed preferential right of the three great Mediterranean powers to furnish advisers and instructors in certain zones, this government feels that it is necessary for it to have more information as to the reason and purpose of such a plan before it can express an intelligent opinion."

There can be no question as to the general interest of this government in the plans for Armenia and the government of the United States is convinced that the civilized world demands and expects the most liberal treatment for that unfortunate country. Its boundaries should be drawn in such a way as to recognize all the legitimate claims of the Armenian people and particularly to give them easy and unimpeded access to the sea. While unaware of the considerations governing the decisions reached by the supreme council, it is felt that special rights over Lazistan would hardly assure to Armenia that access to the sea indispensable to its existence. It is hoped that, taking into consideration the fact that Trebizond always had been the terminus of the trade route across Armenia and that Mr. Venizelos, on behalf of the Greeks of that region, has expressed their preference for connection with Armenia rather than Turkey, the powers will be willing to grant Trebizond to Armenia.

Economic Problems Must be Solved.
"In regard to the relinquishment by Turkey of her rights to Mesopotamia, Arabia, Palestine, Syria and the islands this government suggests to the sea. While unaware of the considerations governing the decisions reached by the supreme council, it is felt that special rights over Lazistan would hardly assure to Armenia that access to the sea indispensable to its existence. It is hoped that, taking into consideration the fact that Trebizond always had been the terminus of the trade route across Armenia and that Mr. Venizelos, on behalf of the Greeks of that region, has expressed their preference for connection with Armenia rather than Turkey, the powers will be willing to grant Trebizond to Armenia."

"In regard to the arrangements for Smyrna, this government is not in a position to express an opinion as the question is too important to be passed on with the limited information this government has as to the

arrangement that is contemplated and the reasons for the same.

"The government of the United States can quite understand the difficulties that have confronted the supreme council in dealing with the economic questions that present themselves for settlement in connection with this treaty. It is easy to see that the problems are complex and fruitful of misunderstanding because of the conflicting interests involved, but this government has every confidence that the problems will be dealt with in a spirit of fairness and with scrupulous regard for the commercial interests of victor, vanquished and neutral."

More Information Requested.

"It is evident that there is yet much to be done before a comprehensive plan can be worked out and this government will welcome further information on the subject of the economic clauses of this treaty. Incidentally the plan that has apparently been worked out by the supreme council in connection with continuation of concessions granted allies and giving the right to revise or cancel concessions on payment of indemnity, referred to in the eighth paragraph of your excellency's note, has grave possibilities and would seem to require careful elucidation."

"Let me say in conclusion that it is the understanding of the government of the United States that whatever territorial changes or arrangements may have been made in the former Ottoman empire, such changes or arrangements will in no way place American citizens or corporations, or the citizens or corporations of any other country, in a less favorable situation than the citizens or corporations of any power party to this treaty."

Editor Statesman: Having been a subscriber for your paper for a number of years and being interested in the sheep industry ever since coming to Oregon I read with interest both sides of the dog and sheep articles published in your papers of recent dates.

Would like to say when in Salem had the pleasure of eating dinner at the home of a man who is pleading and his wife preaching more dogs. The wife took occasion to tell me of their terrible loss. A worthless cat had killed two of their little Plymouth Rock chickens only three days old—some they were raising for broilers and which soon would have been worth \$1.25 each to eat on their table. Now each night the other 19 small chicks have to be securely fastened in with the Ben. Hots the Mr. and Mrs. were very clear in their statements that war had to be waged on cats. I agree with them and wish them success in their undertaking.

Now how about the farmer who is awakened in the night by the joyful barking of dogs and pitiful bleating of sheep and upon rushing to the sheep pasture finds four or five ewes killed and their lambs which are from three to five days old standing near the dead mother hoping for protection, from some one's "valuable dog."

To be sure the sheep are only worth \$10 or \$12 each and the lambs are easily killed or in a more humane way brought to the house and raised by hand. This is not much of task as they only have to be fed four or five times a day and two or three times during the night. The owner of the sheep has a fine chance to kill the dogs caught in the act but he says no, and being a law-abiding citizen (or a fool) he lets the dogs go and next day either buries his wrath in the same hole with the dead sheep or else starts to recover his loss and by so doing makes business lively for the lawyers and helps burden our courts which already have their hands full.

A great many sheep owners are quitting the business on account of the "valuable dog," or boy's "only pet." Which can people get along without the best, mutton and woolen garments or dogs that are so busy sleeping daytime that they have to take night time to prey upon and brutally kill the most timid and innocent of animals?
