NEW JOBBING FIRM BRINGS HEAVY TRADE TO THIS CITY AND MORE CONCERNS COMING

How many Salemites know that in the past six months there has been opened in the Capital City one of the first of what is likely to prove a series of large jobbing concerns? The break has been made that puts Salem on the map and establishes one of the first of a line of jobbing houses that will inevitably find their way to this city as a natural point for distribution for a large and prosperous trade territory.

The firm here referred to is Showalter & Jacobs, that opened its doors for business November 1, and on January 1 transferred its stock and offices to its own spacious quarters with two floors. The old Brown planing mills on Front street were rebuilt especially for this firm for a wholesale grocery, the plant having access to railroads and river.

Has Southern Interests. Both members of the firm are men of long experience in the grocery trade, knowing the ins and outs of the business both wholesale and retail, and they are men in the prime of their business activity. C. W. Showalter came to Oregon from Charleston, W. Va., where he is still hauling a large jobbing business. He was charmed with the Willamette valley and believes he found in Salem the finest opening in the jobbing line in America.

He was not slow to invest his capital and is not sorry he made the leap. He sees great future expansion for trade here.

Fred A. Jacobs was in the grocery trade at Portland for 12 years. He knows the business men of western Oregon, and they know him and he is a believer in the doctrine of an Oregon firm for the Oregon trade and has the spirit and faith in this place as a coming center for distribution. The way the business has grown justifies that faith. Based on sales to date the turnover the first year will exceed half a million in staples.

Radius of Roads Advantage. It is not generally known that big manufacturers of nationally advertised groceries have made Salem a terminal on the same basis with Portland and other jobbing points in the Pacific northwest. They lay their wares down here for distribution on the same terms and at the same

"Don't look around and don't betray any emotion. They are here!"

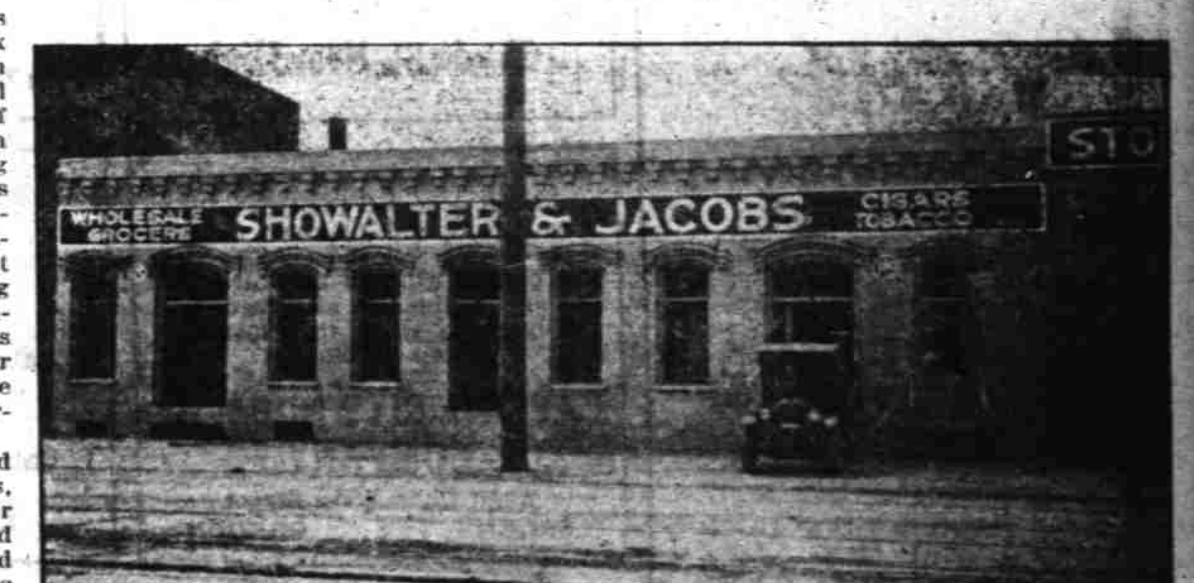
The next moment Grace Draper, regally beautiful as ever, came down the aisle past our table. And following in her wake was Harry Underwood!

Free Delivery Offered. Showalter & Jacobs run a free truck delivery in the city, thus saving merchants cartage and drayage. They have entered this field modestly and are proud to say that they are ambitious to give the trade service such as it has never enjoyed before.
