SPOKANE, Wash., March 1.—Dr. Marion L. Burton, president of the University of Minnesota, was tonight's speaker at the Inland Empire teachers' association's convention here. Dr. Burton addressed a public session of the association in the state armory on "the demands of democracy." For naming a set of officers for the association for next year, a com-

mittee was selected today, to report at the closing session tomorrow afternoon. Under the custom of the association where by the office of President is rotated among the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, a Washington man is expected to be named to head the association.

Wilson Holds Sole
Command on Rhine

WASHINGTON, March 1.—President Wilson informed the house today in response to a resolution of inquiry that American troops on the Rhine still were controlled by the terms of the armistice and were subject only to his orders as commander in chief of the army.

Field Marshal Foch of France, the president said, has no jurisdiction over the troops now are they in any controlled by the decisions of the allied Rhineland commission which makes ordinances and rules for the governing of the territory policed by the allied armies of occupation. Major General Allen, commanding the American troops, the president wrote, has authority to police the territory under his control to preserve order and to "repel any attack which may be made upon him."

DEL MONTE, Cal., March 31.—Golf "heretics" have just concluded their annual "Bletherin" contest here. The "Bletherin" is primarily a cure for nerves. The conditions of the competition are that the players and spectators can dance, yell, sing and do anything, except actually touch the player or his ball. It was first tried at Del Monte last season. In some sections the introduction of noise and rooting on the golf links has been criticised as a Bolshevik movement to assault the honored traditions of the royal and ancient pastime. Players and spectators, however, are in favor of the event as a novelty feature once a year and it was accordingly tried on March 29 and 31 with much success. Through all the noise some very creditable golf was displayed. C. A. Stonehill, a visiting player from Glencoe, Ill., turned up the winner. George Carpenter of Medford, Or., was the last to go out, and he made the creditable medal score of 41 for the first nine. M. A. McLaughlin, Colorado state champion, lasted until the next to the last hole.

Unofficial Reports From
S. Dakota Give Wood 4000

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., April 1.—Unofficial returns from 54 of the 64 counties in the state on the general primary elections of March 23, for Republican presidential endorsement as announced this afternoon by the secretary of state at Pierre shows: Major General Leonard Wood, 26,520; Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, 22,543; United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson, of California, 23,429. General Wood received the majority endorsement for presidential preference at the state convention held December 2, last, while Governor Lowden was the minority choice and Senator Johnson filed as an independent candidate. United States Senator Miles Poindexter, of Washington, also was an independent but polled a comparatively small vote, figures on which were not included in the secretary's announcement today. Indications are that the official count would probably be made Saturday or Monday. No figures on the democratic vote were announced.

Portland Will Have Combine
to Conduct Charity Drives

PORTLAND, April 1.—Portland civic organizations have formed a temporary organization to be known

as the "Portland Community Chest," which it is planned to have taken charge of all drives for funds for charitable purposes. Another object of the organization is to concentrate all such drives into a period of one week during each year, preventing a tag day each week, but making one solid week of tag days. The plans call for another meeting soon to complete organization of the "chest."

Shortage of Labor Leads
to Use of Overtime on Roads

PORTLAND, April 1.—Scarcity of labor, coupled with the desire to complete as soon as possible roads that are essential in the highway system, caused the state highway commission this morning in special session to declare an emergency and authorize contractors to work roadmen on a 10-hour day, with double pay for the overtime.

This speeding up of work was authorized between Mosier and Pendleton, between Roseburg and Coos Bay and on the Three Rivers stretch at Tillamook.
