WILLAMETTE TO BE NAVIGATED

New Company Is Formed to Carry Traffic on Two Oregon Rivers

Freight and passenger traffic on the Willamette and the Columbia rivers is the object of the incorporation yesterday of the Pacific Navigation company, capitalized at \$50,000 and which has headquarters at Portland. The incorporators are Dean Vincent, M. L. Clausen and V. A. Crum. On the Willamette river the terminal points will be Portland and Eugene, and on the Columbia and Snake rivers the company will operate out of Astoria.

Lewis and Priest Rapids, Wash. Other companies filing articles yesterday were: Cooston Co-operative Telephone company, Cooston, Coos county; incorporators, A. R. Mercer, H. W. Walker, R. A. Ness, J. B. Johnson, Frank Demarest; property valuation \$55.

La Grande Box & Lumber company, La Grande; incorporators, W. R. Kivette, E. M. Kivette, D. P. Kivette; capitalization, \$20,000.

Yamhill Timber & Lumber company, Portland; incorporators, John Hayden, Donald M. Graham, M. M. Matthiessen; capitalization, \$30,000.

A permit to operate in Oregon was filed by the Standard Waterproofing company, a Washington corporation, capitalized at \$25,000. E. L. Gordon of Portland is attorney-in-fact for Oregon.

Resolutions were filed by the Norman Maid Creamery company of Portland, increasing the capital stock from \$5,000 to \$10,000, and by the Liberty Coal & Ice company of Portland increasing the capitalization from \$20,000 to \$100,000.

BEAN-BARRETT ACT ABROGATED

Board of Control Must Issue All Road Bonds Under New Statute

All bonds that are sold by the state board of control to procure funds to match federal aid for construction of post and forest roads hereafter must be sold under the statute enacted by the special session of last January and not under the original Bean-Barrett act of 1917. This is the opinion of Attorney General Brown in reply to an inquiry by R. B. Goodin, secretary of the state board of control.

The Bean-Barrett act provided for the sale of \$1,500,000 in bonds, which was sufficient to meet all government money available at that time. The board of control has sold under the act bonds aggregating \$1,200,000. To test out the question whether more than the \$1,500,000 provided for in the act could be sold, the state highway commission late in 1919 requested the board of control to issue \$1,000,000 in addition to the \$1,200,000 already issued, which would have exceeded \$2,200,000 the amount mentioned in the act. The board refused. The commission brought an original proceeding in mandamus in the supreme court which held that the law was not elastic enough to go beyond the \$1,500,000.

This ruling of the court caused the introduction of an act at the special session which superseded the Bean-Barrett act and provided for the sale of bonds to match any amount that might be available from the government.
