

WENDEROTH IS WARD'S CHOICE FOR ALDERMAN

Unanimous Endorsement Is
Given for Representation
From North Salem

PAVING RECOMMENDED
Association Asks Council for
25 Blocks of Hard-Surface
Streets

George Wenderoth last night received the unanimous endorsement of the North Salem Improvement association to represent the Fifth ward as a member of the city council. A petition signed by many names will be presented at the next meeting of the council, which will be Monday night. Mr. Wenderoth is a civil engineer in the employ of the state highway commission. Edward Schunke formerly represented the Fifth ward, but was shifted by the change in the ward boundaries.

This was only one of several important actions taken by the association last night. At the council meeting Monday night petitions will

come from the association asking for the paving of a total of 25 blocks of pavement and 22 blocks of cement sidewalks.

Four Streets Mentioned.
More than 51 per cent of the property owners in the district have signed petitions for the paving of Summer street from Fairgrounds road to Market street, which would give the Pacific highway a straight pavement into the city. Also it was decided to turn in to the council a petition for the paving of Fourth street from Belmont to Pine street. Two other petitions previously acted on by the association also will be submitted to the council Monday night. These ask for the paving of Maple street from Highland avenue north to Locust street, and the paving of Church street from Highland north to Pine street.

It was the unanimous recommendation of the sidewalk committee that 22 blocks of dilapidated wood sidewalks in the district be replaced with cement walks. The repair of 10 blocks of wood walks will be submitted to the council a recommendation that the ordinance requiring that all new sidewalks built in the business district be of cement, be amended to include the entire city. It is held that since lumber is so expensive the cement walks are nearly as cheap, and the situation should be taken advantage of.

The improvements recommended last night are the result of a survey that has been made of the district under the direction of the association.

Amendment Endorsed.

A resolution was adopted endorsing the proposed charter amendment whereby the cost of paving street intersections would be paid by the city and not assessed against corner lots. This also has been endorsed by the Commercial club. Mayor Wilson attended the meeting last night and said he is in favor of the amendment. The association will request the council to put the measure on the ballot and also will urge the Richmond Improvement club and the Salem Heights Improvement association to work to the same end.

Solos were sung by Verden M. Moffit and by C. H. Stevenson. Miss Nell Sykes held the close attention of the audience for nearly an hour as she recounted her experiences in Russia. Among the most thrilling of these were the revolution when the Bolsheviks took control.

Dr. James A. Franklin Is Dat-

According to the schedule sent out by state headquarters Dr. Franklin will speak at the morning service at the Baptist church and will take luncheon with a selected group Sunday at noon. Sunday night he will be in Portland for an address at the White temple.

Sunday will be his only appearance in Salem while in the state. He is dated for Portland, Baker, La Grande, Pendleton, Corvallis, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland, his schedule extending through April 16.

It was found necessary to change the boundaries to conform to district lines. Had this not been done, it is said, there would have been considerable additional expense to the county in the process of formulating the district.

Patient Is Recovering From Sleeping Sickness

After nearly six weeks illness with sleeping sickness, during which time he has been isolated at the state hospital, J. S. Hettick, 52, a laborer at the Spaulding mill is showing definite signs of improvement. His is the first case of sleeping sickness reported in Salem, and as far as known, it is the first case that has been successfully treated. More State Bonds to Pay Interest for Districts

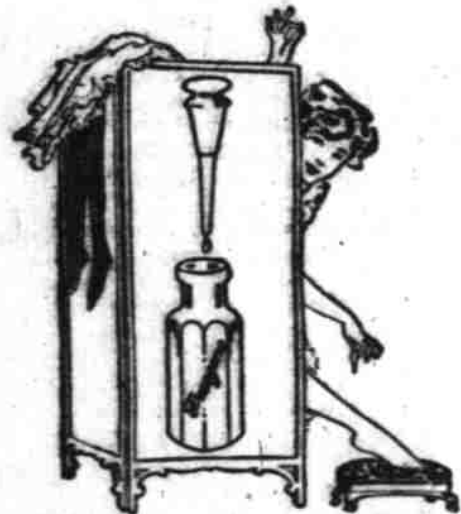
O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, will advertise for sale \$75,000 in state bonds to pay interest for six months on irrigation bonds of the Ochoco irrigation district of \$1,350,000. Interest is 6 per cent. Guarantee of interest has been approved by the state irrigation securities commission. Members of the irrigation securities commission will leave Monday for a trip of inspection in Malheur county over Kinsman colony drainage district and the Warm Springs irrigation district which are asking bond certification of \$50,000 and \$200,000 respectively. The securities commission has certified \$6000 additional in bonds of Multnomah county drainage district No. 1. The total bond issue if \$400,000 and \$218,000 have previously been certified by the commission.

Ontario Man of Many Names Held as Defaulter by Judge

ONTARIO, Or., April 2.—After listening to the testimony introduced by the state in an all day hearing, Justice of the Peace King today held Lester I. Heyman, alias L. Hirsch, alias L. Harris, to the grand jury on the charge of having obtained \$15,000 from the First National Bank of this city under false pretenses. Bail of \$5,500 was furnished by the defendant's attorney. Heyman was arrested in Niagara Falls, N. Y., and brought here last week. W. F. Homan, cashier of the Ontario National bank, testified that in all Hirsch had cleared through the bank between \$225,000 and \$240,000 in eight months last year.

Maryland Wets Become Drowned in Dry Desert

ANNAPOLIS, Md., April 2.—Ending the hopes of Maryland wets for any legislative relief at this session, the senate tonight by a vote of 16 to 1, killed the so-called Jones 3 1/2 per cent beer bill, which had the active support of Governor Ritchie. The bill to permit Sunday moving picture shows in Baltimore was killed 15 to 12. The measure authorizing Sunday sports has also been killed.

Prince of Wales Will Make Public Speech in San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 20.—Announcement that the Prince of Wales, who is expected to arrive here Wednesday on the British battle cruiser Renown, will deliver a public address here, was made in a radiogram received today from the captain of the cruiser, which is proceeding up the Pacific coast from the Panama canal.

The prince will be met on the Renown here by a committee composed of Robert Wood Bliss, representing President Wilson; Governor William D. Stephens of California, Mayor Louis J. Wilde of San Diego and others. After a short sightseeing trip later the prince will go to the city stadium for an address.

For Thursday no set program has been arranged. The Renown will steam from the harbor late that day to continue its trip around the globe with the royal visitor.

Machine Gun Squad Guards Town Threatened by Violence

MAYFIELD, Ky., April 2.—A machine gun squad of the national guard was on duty here tonight following a report that a second attack was to be made on Mayfield tobacco chutes by night riders as a result of the recent decline in the price of tobacco.

A number of citizens spent last night under arms awaiting an attack but none materialized. The machine gun squad was asked for by Judge Gardner of the circuit court as a precautionary measure and was ordered here from Lexington by Governor Morrow.

Judge Gardner instructed a special grand jury to investigate the burning last Friday night of the Mayfield tobacco chute by a band of night riders, said to have numbered 200. The soldiers assisted deputy sheriffs in bringing in witnesses summoned to appear before the grand jury.

The governor has offered a reward of \$200 for the arrest and conviction of each of any ten men who took part in the attack last week.

Reds Subside as State Troops Go Out of Control

LONDON, April 2.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Dusseldorf dated Friday says:

"The government troops, disregarding the Munster arrangement of yesterday, are advancing rapidly. They have beaten back the red troops from Wesel southward and captured Hamm. They are expected here tomorrow."

"The red troops are handing in their arms all over the Rhur district according to agreement."

"The Essen red council has telephoned Berlin concerning the advance of the troops. The government replied that the troops were out of hand."

"Two coal mines are reported already to have been destroyed."

Pratt Becomes Head of Inland Empire Teachers

SPOKANE, Wash., April 2.—Orville C. Pratt, superintendent of schools in this city, was elected president of the Inland Empire Teachers' association at the closing session of the annual convention here this afternoon.

JOHNSON MAKES SCANDAL CHARGE

Regrets That Money Should
be Needed to Secure Nom-
ination for President

DETROIT, Mich., April 2.—Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California, came back to Michigan tonight to close his campaign for presidential preference in Monday's primaries.

Discussing after the war problem, Senator Johnson said he had no fear of a special upheaval; that the country was in no danger of a revolution, but that he had fear reaction. "There are sinister forces at work," he said, "to take away the progress that the people have made in the last few decades. Social justice is the only cure for anarchy."

The senator expressed contempt for two classes of men that have arisen since the war—patrioters and profiteers. "He characterized his campaign as 'an experiment in politics.' 'If I can prove,' he said, 'that a man who has no great wealth and who will not let himself up with those who aim to exploit the government of the United States, can win, I will have done a great thing for the generations to come. In this campaign the contributions that have been made in behalf of some candidates are scandalous.'"

structed by F. N. Derby, costing \$30,000, and which will be used by the Vicks.

Water Service Improves
Among smaller buildings will be the new dormitories at the state institution for the feeble minded, costing \$40,000, and down town on State street will be the new Salvation army hall on which \$20,000 will be expended.

General improvement of the facilities of the Salem Water, Light & Power company this year will represent an outlay of \$32,000. This will embrace the new office building on South Commercial street, a new pump, new mains and several hundred meters which will initiate the new meter system for the city's water service.

Aside from the projects above mentioned are numerous improvements calling for smaller financial outlay individually, but running into many thousands of dollars when taken in the aggregate. A number of these are listed in the tabulation at the head of this article.

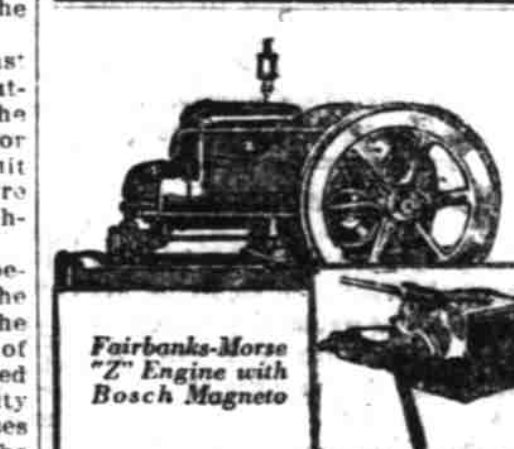
In addition there are several tentative projects of large proportions, which in all probability will be developed next year if not set in motion during the present year.
