City Without Authority

Over Beds of Rivers

Neither the city of Corvallis nor
any other Oregon city has jurisdic-
tion over the sand and gravel of
navigable streams forming one of
the boundaries of the city even
though the corporate limits of the
city as fixed by the legislature ex-
tend to the middle of the channel.
E. E. Wilson, city attorney for Cor-
vallis, has written Attorney General
Brown for enlightenment on this
point in view of an act of the 1920
special session of the legislature au-
thorizing the state land board to
lease the beds of navigable streams
on a royalty basis.

City Without Authority

Over Beds of Rivers

The attorney general has replied
that even though the legislature has
fixed the boundaries of the city it
has not given the cities so affected
jurisdiction over the beds of navi-
gable streams.
