WITH THE RED CROSS

The first obligation of any Red Cross chapter is to its discharged service men who have war-time and demobilization problems. Yet it is safe to say that very few chapters are aware of the large number of these problems that are receiving no attention.

The Bend, Or., chapter has recently demonstrated this fact in a startling way. Sixty questionnaires were distributed to men from the city of Bend at an American Legion meeting. Of all ex-service men in the chapter, these were obviously the group whose wants were most likely to have received attention. Yet the following after-care problems were disclosed in the replies:

Of 60 men, 11 were disabled, four of whom had not filed a claim for compensation; 20 had dropped their insurance, while 40 asked insurance information; 41 had not recorded their discharge certificates; two had never received the \$50 bonus; 19 had not received travel pay to which they were entitled; two had not received liberty bonds for which they had paid the allotments

and allowances to the family of one man had never been adjusted; five desired information as to medical care, one desiring admission to a hospital; 10 sought information regarding vocational training; 34 wanted advice about state aid in furtherance of education; 45 were interested in government plans for land settlement and wished information; 32 had not received victory buttons; five men, or 12 per cent of the total, were unemployed.

Here are 261 demands for services or information from 60 legion men in a chapter headquarters community. What would the demands be from 60 men in the branches? What are the demobilization and after-care problems in your chapter?

Hood River County chapter has placed a first-aid kit in every school in the county and in railroad stations. At the Hood River depot two stretchers have been installed. At the suggestion of the executive committee the county court has appropriated \$2000 for a county nursing service, the chapter sharing in the project by providing an automobile. A county isolation hospital is now being urged by the Red Cross. Largely on its initiative, all county, city and United States public health service medical work has been consolidated in the hands of a single medical officer.
