RURAL LIGHTING EXTENSION HELD UP BY DISPUTE

Residents of Country Communities Bid Eagerly for Illumination

COST QUESTION SERIOUS

Quinaby, Hopmere, Brooks and South Bottom Clamor for Accommodation

A contract to extend an electric light line along the river road north from Salem has not yet been let because of the route of extension being still in dispute.

The intention now is to run the line northward seven miles to Clear Lake school house. From that point an effort is being made to divert the line eastward toward Quinaby, then

north to Hopmere and east again to Brooks. Farmers in the south bottom and Mission bottom are also bidding for an extension of the lighting service to the homes in those agricultural sections. All plans, however, are still up in the air as the average cost of the line seems a little higher than a number of the farmers care to reach, being estimated at about \$1200 to \$1400 a mile.

Further meetings will be held to determine a final location for the line. The people in Brooks are resolved to get service from the Salem lighting system if possible. Every effort is being made to co-operate with farmers along the highways leading from this city to Brooks to reduce to the lowest possible figure the cost of line construction to each one contracting for the service.

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MARKET ROAD FUND ALLOWED

Total Is Over Million and Multnomah County Divides With Neighbors

A total of \$1,744,116.08 under the Pierce market road act of 1919, is available for distribution by the state highway commission to the several counties of the state, all of which have taken advantage of the act by levying a 1 mill tax for market road purposes.

The total amount that has been produced by county levies is \$753,680.61. The total produced by the state through the 1 mill tax on equalized valuation is \$990,435.47, which is the total state fund allotted to the counties.

The act provides that no county shall receive from the state fund an amount in excess of 10 per cent the total state fund. Therefore while Multnomah county pays into the state \$257,279.57, it can receive from the state only 10 per cent of the whole state levy or \$99,043.55. The difference between these two amounts, or \$158,236.02 must be divided proportionately among the other counties.

The total amount received by Marion county under the act is \$100,748.13. Marion county raised by the one-mill levy \$42,292.14. The state tax produces for Marion county \$41,521.29 and Marion's share of the Multnomah county excess is \$16,924.70, making the total state fund allotted the county \$58,455.99, which added to the county tax of \$42,292.14, makes the grand total of \$100,748.13.

Polk county's total share is \$37,700.43.

HOOVER CLUB TO BE FORMED

Newell and Murphy Will Address Mass Meeting in Salem Friday Night

Friends of Herbert Hoover have been invited to attend a mass meeting to be held in the council chamber of the city hall at 8 o'clock, Friday night, April 9. The purpose of the meeting is to form a Hoover club in Salem.

W. K. Newell and Chester Murphy of Portland will be present to help in forming a permanent organization. Murphy and Hoover were boyhood friends in Salem and later attended college together. Mr. Newell has worked for Hoover in the food administration and is an enthusiastic admirer of him as a leader and organizer.

The Hoover sentiment, his adherents declare, is stronger today than ever before and the temporary committee is anxious that the people who knew Hoover as a boy in Salem, and who admire him as a civilian hero of the war, unite to secure for him the endorsement of Oregon at the coming primary election.

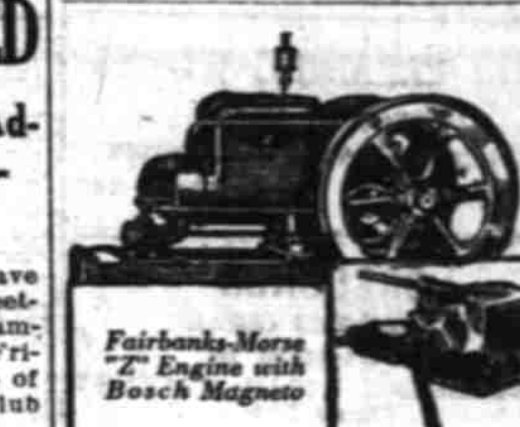
Frank A. Vanderlip in Portland on Way South
