

LOCAL CHURCHES TO BE IMPROVED

Benefit Is Expected as Result of Interchurch Conference Next Week

The Marion county conference of the Inter-church World movement will be held in the First Congregational church on Friday, April 16, the first session starting at 2:30 o'clock according to the committee from the ministerial association

which has the local arrangements for the conference in charge. This is one of the conferences which will be held in every county in Oregon during the early part of April. According to the present arrangements the conference will include representatives from each of the Protestant churches of the county associated with the Inter-church World movement and any other church members or friends of the churches who may wish to attend.

The team of speakers who will have charge of this program at this conference were trained at a speakers' training conference which was held in Portland on Friday, March

26. They will have complete stereoscopic equipment and will present the same slides that were used in the state pastors' conference in Portland in March.

At this conference, which is an outgrowth of the state pastors' conference, an organization will be made for financing and improving the local churches and to mobilize the Christian forces for their part in the campaign to raise Oregon's quota of the budget to be secured during the united simultaneous campaign April 25 to May 2. To carry out this program in its many details there will be set up a county church organization. This will be headed by a county advisory committee, composed of the pastor, a man and woman worker from each church in the county and chosen representatives of the forward movements of each denomination.

Portland Woman Wants to go to Democratic National Convention

Alice M. McNaught yesterday filed with the secretary of state as a candidate for delegate to the national Democratic convention. Her slogan is: "Democracy, which is the honest sentiment of the masses." Her platform reads as follows: "I believe that women should have equal rights and privileges with men, socially and politically in all affairs of the nation and state. I am first, last and always a Democrat. I believe in democracy in the fullest sense of the word. I am for the league of nations. I am for the great seething mass of employed men and women—not as expressed through their leaders, always, but for the rank and file, of which I am one. I endorse President Wilson and his policies during the world war. Lastly, urge square deal for ex-service men."

THE GASOLINE SITUATION

The Necessity of Conservation
