

Dwellings Completed by Canada for Her Veterans

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 8.—Forty-seven dwellings, to be sold to veterans on the long term payment plan, have been constructed or are under construction by the city of Vancouver, it was announced recently. The provincial government turned over \$300,000 to the city to be used as a revolving fund for the construction of the homes. The fund was obtained by the province from the Dominion government, under the Soldiers' Housing act. Most of the homes are modern.

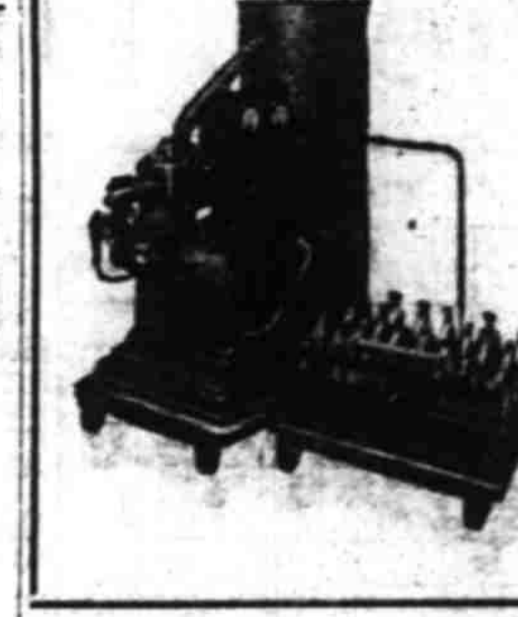
