Water Applications—The St. Helens water commission filed with the state engineer Saturday an application for a permit to appropriate 30 second feet of water from Milton creek to serve as a municipal water supply. The city is reconstructing its water system, and to give greater pressure will make the intake a considerable distance above the present intake. The improvement will cost an estimated \$12,000. A. D. Helms of Ashland filed an application to appropriate 50 second feet from the South Umpqua river for the irrigation of 3000 acres of land near the town of Days Creek. It will necessitate the construction of a canal several miles in length. George Sutin of Freewater, Or., has filed an application covering the appropriation of water from the west branch of the Little Walla Walla river for the irrigation of a small area near Freewater.

Benjamin Edelberg, a civil engineer of Buenos Aires, Argentine Republic, has written the state engineering department for the text of the Oregon water code. The code has been in demand for several years.
