Mr. Thomas next appeared with a number of varied selections; "A Home Made Fairy Tale," by James Whitcomb Riley; "America For Me," by Henry Van Dyke; "At the Glee Club Concert," by Lindsay Barbee; "A Letter," "My Star," and "A Sonnet" all by Browning, and an arena scene from "Quo Vadis" by Henry Sienkiewicz.

In the heavy selection from "uQuo Vadis" Mr. Thomas displayed his dramatic abilities in the highest form. This was the most difficult piece of the evening and was regarded as his masterpiece. In the Riley selection, power of the opposite type was required to develop the light and fanciful aspect. The lyrics from Browning were remarkable for the intense subjective understanding with which Mr. Thomas penetrated the works of this deep author. The short story "Cotton for Cotton" was read by Miss Notson, who entered into the spirit of her characters in such a way as to make the story vividly realistic.

Music was furnished by Miss Evelyn DeLong and Miss Marguerite Cook. Miss De Long gave an organ solo "Offertoire from St. Cecelie" by Baptiste and Miss Cook sang "By the Waters of Minnetanka," by Lieurance. The last number of the program was a classic comedy—scenes from "A School for Scandal," by Richard Sheridan, in which Mr. Thomas took the part of Lord Teazle, while Miss Notson took the part of Lady Teazle. This number was much enjoyed by the audience because of its rich and satirical humor.

Ushers for the evening were Misses Maude Holland, Dean Hattan, Faye McInnis and Mildred Stevens. This is the first of a series of six public recitals that are to be given by the public speaking department of Willamette university. There will be a recital each Tuesday evening until the six have been given. The next one will be a lecture recital given by Bryan Conley April 20.
