An indication of the universal sentiment regarding the prisoners, apart from political bias, is shown by an appeal from Chief Rabbl Herzog to the viceroy for clemency for "the unfortunate men at grips with death in Mountjoy.'

Expect Much of New Commander. there is much speculation regarding the motive of the government's sudden change of policy. Public rumor attributes it to the influence of General MacReady, who has taken up his duties as commander in chief of the forces in Ireland. He is said to have great hopes of making military rule in Ireland more effective and more tolerable and he did not want to start with deaths and inquests in Mountjoy.

As the 89 hunger strikers had been starving themselves for 10 days the form of the official announcement that those requiring medical treatment outside of the prison would be released, was taken to mean that all of them would be freed, and that this would be a way for covering the government's retreat from its former position.

Eighty-one of the hunger strikers had not been tried. Twenty were imprisoned under the defense of the realm act, without an indication even of the charge against them other than that their detention was merely preventive. Sixty were awaiting trial, mostly by court martial for sedition, though no charges had been made against them.

BRITISH IN CHANGE OF HEART LONDON, April 15.—The release of the Irish prisoners was by direct order of General Sir Neville Mac-Ready, and marks the beginning of an entire change in the Irish policy, according to a prominently displayed statement in the Daily Mail.


When it became clear some time ago, says this paper, that the policy of repression was leading to disastrous consequences, the premier decided to change the policy, and, if necessary, get rid of the men associated with the old regime. He suddenly and without warning told J. I. MacPherson, chief secretary for Ireland, that he was to be transferred to the Pensions ministry and appoint-Jeneral MacReady in command of the troops, without consulting the Irish office. General MacReady, adds the mail, was instructed to inaugurate a new policy of conciliation, and was given a free hand. In other words, he was to supercede the existing heads of the government in

General MacReady arrived in Dubin Wednesday and ordered the release of the prisoners after an exchange of wireless messages with Premier Lloyd George, according to the Daily Mail.

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

General Pershing Would Not Refuse Presidency

WASHINGTON, April 14 .- While Géneral Pershing is not seeking a presidential nomination, he told fellow Nebraskans here tonight at a reception given in his honor by the local Nebraska society that "no patriotic American" could refuse to serve if called "by the people."

The statement followed references by other speakers to a movement in Nebraska to name General Pershing as the "favorite son" candidate from that state for the republican nomination.

"It seems fitting that I should say to you, my friends," General Pershing said, "that my whole life has

been devoted to the service of our country, and while in no sense seeking it, I feel that no patriotic American could decline to serve in that high position if called upon to do so by the people."
