

DEMOCRATS TRY TO MEND BREAK

Effort Is Inaugurated to Elect Committeeman to Succeed Hornbrook

Strife within the Democratic party in Oregon is apparently leading to efforts to unite the party by the election of a national committeeman at the primary election May 21, to fill the vacancy caused by the

resignation of Will H. Hornbrook, who was elected in 1918 and who later resigned.
Dr. J. W. Morrow of Portland today filed his declaration of candidacy for the office. A few days ago a letter came from J. D. Brown, who has succeeded H. G. Starkweather as chairman of the state central committee, explaining that under the proceedings of the Democratic national convention of 1916 the term of the national committee expires with the conclusion of the next following national convention. This, however, is contrary to the state law, which provided that the national committeeman for Oregon should be elected in the year 1914 and every four years thereafter, vacancies to be filled by ap-
