UNREST CAUSE IS EXPLAINED BY MR. GRAM

State Labor Commissioner Deplors Lack of Sympathy Toward Worker

AGENCIES ARE CRITICISED

Executive Manager of Portland Chamber to Address Club Next Monday

Lack of sympathy of employers with the cause of workers and misrepresentation by employment agencies were mentioned by Charles H. Gram, state labor commissioner, at the Monday noon luncheon of the Salem Commercial club as two of the causes of unrest among the laborers of the United States.

Mr. Gram declared that the present unrest is greater than at any other time in his remembrance, and he asserted that increasing wages will not cure it because when the word that wages is to be increased goes out there is at once a corresponding increase in the cost of commodities that are necessary for the use of laboring people.

Employment agencies that misrepresent the condition of employment, or that frequently cause laborers to travel long distances to places where they are told men are wanted only to find that they are not wanted Mr. Gram said are making Bolsheviks and I. W. W.

"I contend that there are Bolsheviks on both sides," said Mr. Gram. Commissioner Gram deplored the lack of sympathy between the employer and the men who work for him, comparing present conditions in this respect with the former times when employers worked with the men they employed and understood their needs and their problems.

Overtime Pay Collected. The commissioner said that in the 15 months he has been in office his department has collected \$15,000 for men from employers who worked them overtime with no intention of allowing them pay for overtime.

"If every employer treated his men fairly as some do in this state," said Mr. Gram, "there would be no labor organizations. They would fall of their own weight."

Thomas B. Kay, former state treasurer, and who is manager of the Salem Woolen mills, was called upon as an employer who has the reputation of dealing squarely with his employees and in whose mill there is no organization of workers largely due to the fact that he himself went to work in the mill when he was 10 years old and for a number of years did the same work the other workers are doing. He said he had never felt "above" the men who work for him and did not believe any other employer was justified in considering himself better than his employees. Mr. Kay said that he is in sympathy with labor unions in most of the things for which they stand.

Salem First, Says Sisson. B. E. Sisson, manager of the Salem store of the Miller Mercantile company corrected an impression that has gone out that the company is a typical chain store system. He said that while the company has stores in a number of western Oregon towns each store is a local concern and all stockholders are Oregon people.

"In Salem," said Mr. Sisson, "we are for Salem first, Marion county next, the state of Oregon next and the United States next."

M. H. Harlow, one of the Lane county commissioners, spoke briefly on road work in Lane county. W. D. B. Dobson, executive manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, will address the club next Monday.

Increased labor and production are the two requisites needed to solve the high cost of clothing and other necessities, he said, adding, "The insolvency of a few hundred small merchants would not solve the problem."

Any attempt at profiteering by overall dealers will be met with federal prosecution under the Lever act, federal agents declared.

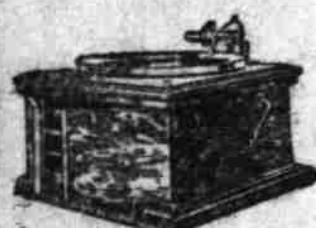

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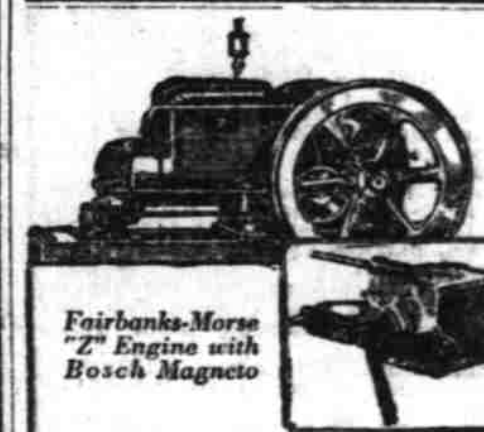
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
