

BUSINESS MEN HEAR ADDRESS BY MAC LEAN

Secretary of State Retail Merchants Association Visits League

CANDIDATES CALLED ON

Riggs, Perry and Patton Forced to Brush Modesty Aside and Talk

There was a larger attendance than usual at the regular meeting of the Business Men's league last night in the auditorium of the Commercial club. This was partly due, perhaps, to the meeting notice hav-

ing informed the members that there would be "no politics" and no scheme for donations, and so forth, and partly to the announcement that Edward A. McLean of Portland, secretary of the Oregon State Retail Merchants' association would address the meeting.

The recent creation of the Oregon State Retail Merchants' association by the consolidation of the two former rival state associations was due in part to the active and diplomatic work of Secretary MacLean, and his talk to the Salem men on the work of the state organization was listened to with interest.

He expressed particular appreciation for the loyal and valuable support given during the last three years by the Business Men's league to the movement for one united and harmonious state organization of retail merchants.

Resentment by retail merchants generally of charges of profiteering was freely expressed in the discussion which followed, several speakers citing instances where such charges had been made by politicians in government service, so it

was said, absolutely without foundation. Some of the speakers illustrated actual conditions by reporting that they were selling many items today for less than they could get new supplies for under the condition of rapidly increasing prices.

The notice of "no politics" was finally waived by calling on Z. J. Riggs, J. C. Perry, both candidates for the legislature, for speeches, and Hal D. Patton, candidate for election to the council.

Although Secretary MacLean made no reference to it in his address, his name also will appear on the ballot in the coming primaries as a candidate for delegate at large from Oregon to the Republican national convention in Chicago.

Mr. MacLean is an ardent advocate of the participation by the United States in the league of nations, and as a candidate for delegate seeks the support of Republicans who wish to see their party declare for active participation in the league with such reservations to the covenant as may seem wise or necessary to a Republican national administration.

SALVATIONISTS TO GET PORTION OF FUNDS HERE

Unique Plan Is Devised for Collection of Quota in This Vicinity

YOUNG MEN ENLISTED

Funds Go to Betterment of Boys and Girls Cared for by the Army

The Salvation Army needs no introduction to Salem people. It is known the army has never asked for anything from the public for which it did not give fully 100 per cent in return.

Now this working charitable organization is about to call on all the good people of Salem and Marion county to help it secure a home for the needy boys who may come under its care. This home is now surrounded by 10 acres of land. It is situated near Yamhill. The soil is productive and the young charges will be taught the principles of practical farming by actually growing the crops on this acreage under the instruction of a real farmer.

Local Quota Is Fixed. The campaign in Salem and Marion county will be unique in that it will be carried out by young business men and ex-service men. Instead of asking the heads of firms to give their time to the work, each will be asked to contribute the services of one salesman or other employee.

It will take some money to get possession of the real property so the Salvation Army may start this good work for needy boys. It has been figured out just how much each county should contribute to make this project possible. The quota for Salem and Marion county has been fixed at \$13,300.

An organization to collect this amount from the people of this city and county, has been perfected and the campaign for funds will start on May 1.

The county chairman is A. C. Bohrnstedt and L. J. Simeral is county vice chairman. E. J. Norene has been chosen secretary and Fred Lamport is the treasurer.

The organization committees has also been chosen. Those to serve in this capacity are T. E. McCroskey, chairman, A. C. Bohrnstedt, L. J. Simeral and William McGilchrist.

Speakers Will Come. The members of the publicity committee are Dr. B. F. Pound, Dr. Henry Morris and Jesse Huber.

It is the plan of the Management of this campaign to have the need of this home presented to the people by public speakers. Such speakers will be selected by a committee composed of James Elvin, Luther J. Chapin and T. E. McCroskey.

sulted in the indictment of Captain John F. Blain, western manager for the United States shipping board.

"It will be impossible to say how long it will be before our work is completed. But when the proper time comes all evidence which is uncovered will be presented to the federal grand jury in Portland."

After the investigation has been completed locally Mr. Wheeler said, the investigators expected to be ordered to San Francisco where the probe will be renewed. Facts uncovered during the Seattle inquiry are said to have been of sufficient importance to impel the department of justice to make its investigation coastwide in scope.

MARSHALL ON AMERICANISM

Sub President Airs Views on Causes of Present Unrest; Blames Profiteer

NEW YORK, April 20.—Vice President Marshall was applauded by members of the Associated Press at their annual meeting today when he advocated freedom of speech and press as guaranteed by the constitution, but favored "soaking it to the fellow who causes trouble in the American republic by what he says."

He drew a distinction as to the rights of free speech between those who were born in the country and others. Native born, he said, had the right to advocate alteration of the government by constitutional means to Socialism or monarchy, but those who sought to have in this country had no right to propose a change in the system of government.

The vice president was the chief speaker at the luncheon of the members in connection with the annual meeting, at which the retiring five directors were re-elected by acclamation and four advisory boards and auditing and nominating committees were chosen.

After deprecating the great amount of publicity to crime and suggesting that newspapers pour oil on the troubled waters of unrest by speaking of the fine things in American life, Mr. Marshall told the meeting what he thought would be real news, namely "a clarion call from every newspaper in America for men to stand for justice, for freedom, for right, for the maintenance of the old constitution and the old principles upon which the republic was founded."

There are a great many people," he continued, "who think we are going back to where we were before August 1, 1914. We are not going back there, gentlemen. I would to God it were possible to go back to 1840. But we live in the year of grace 1920 and we are not going back. . . . And you know and I know, whether we close our eyes to it or not, that ten million men did not agonize and suffer and die upon the far-flung lines of Flanders and France that the world might be what the world was.

"The problem for the Associated Press is as to whether it is to act as a mere machine, or whether with

the opportunities and the privileges the Associated Press has, it will assume some of the responsibilities for bringing peace and quietude, and good order at least to America if not the world."

The vice president counseled against being discouraged at high prices. He recalled the days after the Civil war when, he said, flour sold for \$20 a barrel, quinine for \$20 an ounce and calico for 80 cents a yard.

"Let us get down from the theory," he said, "that we must either make all the money that we can today for tomorrow we die, or we must spend all the money we have today for fear there will be none tomorrow. Former Navigator May Face Serious Charges

GARDINER, Or., April 20.—Captain Gus Westerdale of this city, retired navigator and former master of the steam trawler Ituna, wrecked off San Francisco the night of Mar. 13, expressed surprise today when he received a report that he was to be summoned to face an inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the sinking of the trawler.

Captain Westerdale said that any charge that he had abandoned Geo. Nevin seaman in his bunk when the Ituna was escaped left the sinking craft was foolish. He said that at the time of the wreck the Ituna was in charge of the mate. He declared that he was called on deck and immediately summoned all hands on deck. Seven minutes after the alarm was given, Captain Westerdale said the trawler sank. Nevin's absence, Captain Westerdale said, was not noticed by any of those in the life boat until half an hour after the Ituna sank.

The Ituna disaster was investigated by the United States department of commerce in San Francisco and the case was dismissed.

Irish Republican Issues Reply to Ambassador Geddes

WASHINGTON, April 20.—H. J. Boland, member of the parliament of the "provisional Irish republic," issued a statement here today on the Irish question in reply to views expressed yesterday at New York by Sir Auckland Geddes, new British ambassador to the United States.

"Ireland refused to take any position within the framework of the British empire, said Mr. Boland. "She feels as the American colonials felt that the right of a people to liberty is a self-evident truth."

"Sir Auckland Geddes, in suggesting that all other peoples stand aside in this controversy assumes the right to speak for Ireland, as well as Great Britain. The Irish have repudiated Britain. The only people in a position to speak for Ireland in America are those officially indicated by the Irish parliament. The British ambassador assumes to present the Irish question to the American people as a domestic matter of Great Britain. The

Allies Offer New Republics Free Ports on Turkish Land

SAN REMO, April 20.—At the afternoon session the supreme council decided to insert a clause in the Turkish treaty making Batum a free port for the republics of Azerbaijan, Georgia and Armenia. The council spent considerable time considering the protection of minorities in Anatolia. It approved the financial articles of the treaty. The reply to President Wilson being drafted by the British is ready for examination. A note from the league of nations concerning the mandate over Armenia. The note pointed out that the league of nations had no funds, no staff and no military forces with which to carry out the mandate. The league asked whether the governments composing the supreme council would provide the necessary resources.

World's Prize Bigamist Recovering From Wounds

LOS ANGELES, April 20.—James R. Huirt, alleged bigamist, questioned late today at the Los Angeles county hospital by A. L. Manning, chief deputy sheriff, concerning the women he is alleged to have married and who are said to be missing, declared they were all "in the east," Mr. Manning said, after the interview.

Huirt asserted, according to Mr. Manning, that Nina Lee Deloney,

one of the alleged missing wives, for whom deputy sheriffs have been searching in San Diego and Imperial counties, was in Kansas City but said he did not know her address. He promised to explain everything later.

Mrs. Elizabeth L. Williamson, who said Huirt married her in Sacramento last fall, also talked with him today. These were the first visitors the man had been permitted to see since taken to the hospital.

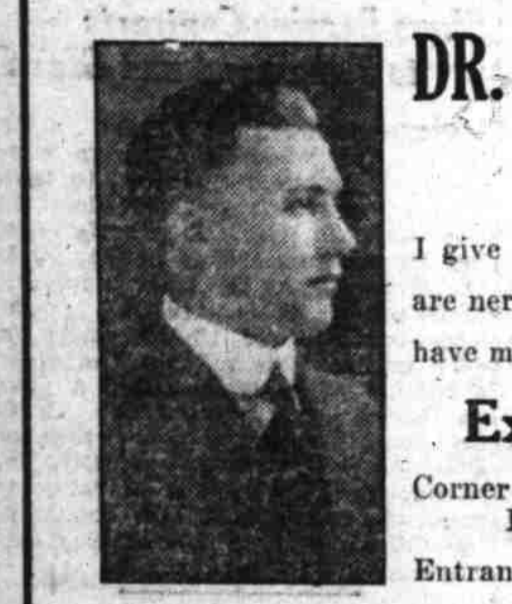
