Willamette Men's Glee Club
Surpasses All Previous Appearances

The Willamette Men's Glee club sang to a full house last night at the Grand opera house. Many people availed themselves of standing room in the back of the theatre while others left because all of the seats were occupied. The concert was one of the finest that has ever been heard here, according to Salem residents and critics in attendance.

Every number on the program was encored, causing an unusually lengthy program of two and a half hours but during it all the audience never seemed to grow restless or tired. The program was varied, and during its progress called forth nearly every possible human emotion. The negro melodies and college songs given by the Varsity quartet met with an unusual demonstration of applause. The comedy given by Harold Emmel and Everett Craven entitled "Burr Saw" also met with popular favor, and also one when the "Real Varsity Quartet" sang "Feed the Baby Onions so That You Can Find It in the Adk."

The cornet solo by Loren Basler was greatly applauded. The entire glee club made five different appearances. The first time the club sang "Jolly Students," by Mendenhall and "Hark the Horn Awakes the Morn," by Randegger. At the second appearance they sang "The Song of the Viking," by Fanning and "Honey Town," by Weldner. The third time they appeared it was to sing "The Song of Prince Rupert's Men," by Thayer and "A Summer's Lullaby," by Gibson.

During the second part of the program the club sang first "How Steep the Brave" by Clark and "Stars and Stripes," by Sousa, and the finishing numbers "Estudiantina," by Lacome and "Ode to Willamette," by Mendenhall, during which all present who were in any connected with Willamette or were alumni stood in honor of their institution.

Floyd McIntyre sang a beautiful song "The Pipes of Pan," by Elgar, in a very pleasing manner. Vernon Sackett sang "Route Marchin'" by Stock, and his rich full notes were much applauded. Price of Fish Going Down, Says Mr. Fitts

"The price of fish is on the decline," says W. S. Fitts, local fish dealer. This will help somewhat to stem the ever-rising tide of the high cost of living.

Mr. Fitts continues: "Owing to the annual closed season on salmon and the unsettled weather conditions at sea, it has been hard for us to keep the price of fish within the reach of the public for the last few months. But conditions are changing now, enabling us to lower the prices on all varieties of fish as well as to get a better supply and a better variety. As weather conditions improve we expect prices to decline still more."

Mr. Fitts is one of the oldest dealers in fish in the state and knows the fish game from A to Z, having been in the fish business in Salem for 19 years. Mr. Fitts is also one of the heaviest stockholders of a Newport Ice & Fish company, a deep sea fishing concern off the coast of Oregon, with headquarters at Newport. This makes it possible for Salem people to buy fish fresh from the sea, a distinction worthy of note since Salem is the only city in the state where fish can be marketed fresh from the ocean.

This will be the watchword of the Salem Boy Scouts in the future, for the United States naval department, through the medium of the national council, Boy Scouts of America, has presented the Salem scouts with a 66-foot, three-masted sloop, which will be used by the newly organized Sea Scouts of which P.
