

MACLEAN IS FOUR SQUARE FOR LEAGUE

Candidate for Delegate to National Convention States Principles

PROMPT ACTION URGED

Prevention of War and Protection of National Honor Held Paramount

Outspoken advocacy of active and whole-hearted participation by the United States in the league of nations is the platform on which Edward A. MacLean seeks election in the coming primaries as a delegate at large from the state of Oregon to the Republican national convention.

"I believe it would be nothing less than a calamity," says Mr. MacLean, "for the Republican national convention to fail to make a straight-out declaration for prompt and active participation in the league of nations."

Faith in Party.
"I take it for granted that no serious or worthy objection can be made to any reservations which may be wise or necessary to safeguard the interests of the United States. So far as I am concerned, I would leave that matter to a Republican president and a Republican senate, with full confidence that they would find a way to safeguard every American interest, while at the same time arousing no objections from the other nations, members of the league."

"In my judgment no other issue can be raised between now and next November which can anywhere nearly equal the league of nations issue in interest or in importance."

"I am one of those who feel that the United States will not have played true to the supreme sacrifice made by our boys who gave up their lives in France, if we leave a single thing undone to prevent another war, if human effort can prevent it."

Reforms Come Rapidly.
"I know there are those who feel that it is impossible to prevent war, but the prospect of perpetual world peace seems to me a great deal nearer than such a great reform as national prohibition seemed a few short years ago."

"Things move swiftly nowadays. Great reforms are simply a matter of getting the public fully to understand the matter. When public opinion can once be set, the tide of public sentiment is irresistible and the thing is done."

"There is not a civilized government in the world that does not prohibit individuals from settling their differences by fighting—and the world is coming to understand that the same rule must be applied to nations."

"The nations must be compelled to submit their differences to settlement according to law and justice, the same as individuals."

In his official campaign statement, Mr. MacLean says:

"The Republican party began by electing the immortal Lincoln on the proposition that humanity was entitled to freedom and a square deal, even if its skin was black."

"The Republican party cannot better live up to the noble spirit of its beginning than by putting the United States into leadership in the league of nations."

"That leadership we can use powerfully to maintain world peace on the basis of international justice—to hasten the enlightenment of backward races and their ability for self-government and to stand eternally as the determined sponsor of the square deal between nations."

Slogan Indicates Preference.
Under the Oregon primary law, the delegates must vote for the presidential candidate winning in the primary election. Mr. MacLean states he will comply with that provision cheerfully and faithfully, while indicating his own preferences in his slogan:

"For outspoken league of nations man like Taft, Hoover or Hughes."

Mr. MacLean has his office in Portland, as secretary of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association and editor of the Oregon Merchants' Magazine, but lives and is a registered voter at Lake Grove, on Oswego Lake, in Clackamas county. He particularly likes to be identified as "Edward A. MacLean of Clackamas county," not only because that is his home, but because, just as he is a warm advocate of the league of nations, he is also a confirmed enthusiast, not merely for Portland, but for the great Oregon outside of Portland that many Portlanders do not fully appreciate.

The season in Idaho does not open for a month yet, and all of the Rupert players are in Portland and are anxious to tangle with the Senators.

The Rupert team was scheduled to play here both Saturday and Sunday, but owing to uncertain weather Manager Biddie Bishop of the Senators will not book any more Saturday games until later in the season. When the weather is settled Salem will have two games a week.

Fast Clubs Coming.

Games have been arranged with all the fastest clubs in the northwest, and Salem fans will see real live baseball this summer. The Senators are a fast club and when they get a little warm weather to loosen up on will show some speed. None of the Salem boys has had a chance to show anything yet, but Manager Bishop says, "give us some sunshine and we will battle any of them."

The games with Moose Jaw last Saturday and Sunday showed that the local boys have the stuff, but lack of practice told against them. Manager Nick Williams of the Moose Jaws said he would like to have some of the Senators, but all the boys are satisfied to remain here and play for the Cherry City, and they feel sure the fans will do their part to make Salem a real baseball town.

Grounds Developing Rapidly.
"Our grounds will be in shape

soon," said Manager Bishop, "and the park is a credit to any town, and if Old Man Sun comes out and shows his face for a few days in succession the ground will come into shape fast. We were to play a series of six games with the Moose Jaw club, but again Old Sol put the jinx on the games by trying to flood the country. But we will have lots of baseball and our Salem club will win its share of the games."

The Moose Jaw team is still in Salem, but will leave Friday morning for Spokane.

HILL DISTRICT BOOSTS BERRY

More Energy Will be Devoted to Production of Preferred Variety

SILVERTON, Or., April 21.—(Special to The Statesman).—"Grow strawberries" is fast becoming the slogan for the Silverton Hills district. At a recent meeting of the hill farmers at the Mountain View school house considerable enthusiasm was shown. C. A. Hartley of the Silverton Food Products company was present and explained that the cannery was ready to cooperate in strawberry growing.

Every season there is a greater demand for the hill berry than the valley berry. Many of the housewives wait with canning until the hill strawberries are put on the market which is usually about three weeks later than the valley berry. The reason for this is that it has

been discovered that the hill berry cans much firmer and does not shrink.

It has been demonstrated that an acre in strawberries will bring approximately 500 per cent more than any other crop. The hill acreage of strawberries has been greatly increased this year.
