Dean George H. Alden has visited McMinnville and has succeeded in organizing the town in behalf of the university. He has also projected the organization of the college aid at Forest Grove.

President Doney has organized the friends of the institution in Hillsboro. Dr. B. L. Steeves and A. A. Lee will devote Friday to perfecting the organization in Albany.

Ronald Glover has promoted the campaign in Canby, and next Sunday President Doney will devote to the interests of the institution, in Central Methodist church in Portland.

Much interest has been aroused in the undertaking throughout the state and many people outside of the church are taking an interest in the project, but more especially the Methodists are manifesting great concern for the success of the campaign.

During the first week in May it is planned to canvass the territories in an attempt to obtain the money needed for the present emergencies of the institution.

College's History Cited Willamette university is the oldest center of higher learning in the state, having been founded by the early Methodist missionaries, Jason Lee and his associates.

Willamette has always enjoyed a reputation for having a serious-minded student body, sensible and industrious, and a well-trained and conscientious faculty.

This has brought more students to the university than the institution can provide for in the desired manner. Hence it has become necessary to launch this campaign for additional funds with which to rebuild Waller hall, one of the larger buildings of the campus which was nearly destroyed by fire during the last Christmas vacation, and to build a greater Lausanne hall as a residence for women students.

While Republican Delaware's legislature has been considering whether to ratify the woman suffrage amendment and thus become the thirty-sixth state to give approval and make suffrage a fact, Democratic Mississippi's senate reversed its action of January 21 and passed the ratification resolution. The signature of Governor Lee M. Russell is not necessary in Mississippi but he is friendly to the suffrage measure and had a "heart to heart talk" with the members of the House. He informed members of the National Woman's Party that there is a "good chance" of the lower house taking favorable action before the legislative session ends on April 3.
