He was 35 years old. He was a resident of Salem about 10 years ago and at that time was a printer for the Capitol Journal. Since going to Portland he has been with the Oregonian. He leaves three sisters and four brothers, Mrs. Arthur H. Moore of this city, Mrs. R. Diller of Portland, Mrs. George S. Woodford of Portland, Henry B. Ryan of Albany, Edward Ryan of Eugene, Al Ryan of Portland and Alger Ryan of Tillamook.

The funeral service will be held in Portland at the Holman establishment Sunday at 2 p. m. The body will later be cremated.

State Training School Offers Big Opportunity

"Nowhere could the state of Oregon more profitably spend money than at the state training school for boys."

This is the conclusion of Howard McGowan, Reed college sociologist, who brought a party of Reed students down from Portland to inspect state institutions this week.

"At the feeble minded institute money has been well spent in equipping a splendid plant," said Mr. McGowan, "but all that can be done for these unfortunates is to make them comfortable. The training school has been neglected, when expenditure for the proper sort of buildings and care would bring sure returns in better citizens for the state. Many of the boys are normal, wide-awake kids, 'bad actors,' who have gone wrong, but better surroundings and more individual attention from trained social workers would turn a lot more of them into responsible citizens. The superintendent is doing wonders with the equipment at hand. The state should provide him

with an institution worthy of the name."
