

BLOSSOM DAY LARK FOR TWO SALEM GIRLS IS AIRPLANE JUMP TO PORTLAND IN "SEA GULL"

There are thrills and more thrills in sailing through the air high above the city and over the hills and valleys in an airplane, but the real thrills and the keenest pleasure is gotten from a seaplane as it majestically skims over the water and gradually takes the air. Lots of people will tell you that, especially those who enjoyed trips over the country around Sandy in the beautiful plane, "Sea Gull," which was piloted here Sunday by Walter E. Lee of the Oregon, Washington, Idaho Airplane company, of Portland.

After donning helmets, goggles and other necessities of air traveling, we, Miss Agnes C. Bayne, Walter E. Lee, the skillful pilot, and I hopped

off from the Court street landing for Portland at 5:39 p. m. Sunday. Heading northward we gradually climbed higher and higher until the little barometer in the front of the cockpit registered 3000 feet. We followed the course of the Willamette river all the way down. Way down below us stretched fairylands of white blossoms which were set in beds of brilliant green. Here and there a tiny little white spot indicated the homes of the people on a world of their own. From Mountain range to mountain range the beautiful Willamette valley lay bathed in the warm sunlight of a perfect day.

Non-Partisan League Methods Uncovered by Arthur Foster, Farmer

LEGISLATURE IS FLAYED

Senator Walter M. Pierce Explains Working of Proposed Split Session

The Non-Partisan league, which had its origin in North Dakota, is now entrenched in the state of Washington.

Two thousand members of this militant organization of farmers are in Clark county and 1700 are in Killekat county just across the Columbia from Oregon.

These farmers have paid membership dues of \$15 each. They now have a campaign fund of about \$65,000 to use in those two counties alone.

In Washington the Non-Partisan league parades under the cloak of the Triple alliance. This is an organization of farmers, members of the labor unions and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Trainmen.

These were statements made in the auditorium of the Commercial club last night by Arthur Foster, a farmer of North Dakota, but who has been residing in Portland during the past two years.

League Methods Exposed. Mr. Foster recounted at length the manner in which the league in North Dakota usurped the powers of the state by turning the resources of that commonwealth toward the support of their own political organization.

He admitted that great abuses had been practiced against the grain farmers in that state by speculative buyers. It was the attempt to remedy the wrongs suffered by farmers, growing out of unfair grading of their grain, that gave rise and impetus to the Non-Partisan league.

"But," said Mr. Foster, "the necessary reforms would have been brought about by the various cooperative associations that had already been organized and at work when the league came into power."

The speaker predicted that the

its mills could easily be distinguished from the others as we traveled on, thoroughly enjoying every moment of the time. It is a fine thing that the Oregon, Washington, Idaho Airplane company is planning to put on a passenger service between Salem and Portland.

Just before we arrived we sighted an airplane flying over the field in Portland. Then beautifully our plane descended to the water and we skimmed over to the landing which is at Gilles lake in North Portland, arriving there exactly 60 minutes after leaving Salem. It wasn't a very long time but it was exciting and every moment was happy.

league in North Dakota would be defeated within a year or two; but that it would be a long time before the wrongs that had been done by their operation in that state could be remedied.

Pierce Endorses Speech

Senator Walter M. Pierce, the well-known legislator from eastern Oregon, affirmed what Mr. Foster had said. He then launched into the discussion with his sleeves rolled up and delivered some telling blows against socialism and all other phases of new and untried isms now being proposed as panaceas for industrial and governmental ills.

"We have never been so well fed and so well clothed. Our workmen have never received such high wages as they have been getting. And yet, there has never been so much dissatisfaction and discontent abroad in the land as there is today. What is wrong?" he said.

The senator then proceeded to enumerate several of these wrongs. These, he said, must be remedied by the people who have it in their power to bring about a change if they hope to hold in check the advance of the Non-Partisan league and similar socialist organizations.

The senator is himself an extensive farmer in eastern Oregon. He stated that others like himself, have helped bring wealth to several Portland families who deal in food products.

Class Drift Deplored. "We are drifting into classes and taking on class consciousness. This is not true Americanism," said the senator.

"What does socialism mean?" he asked. Answering his own question he said it means the end of private property rights. "The right to hold the fruits of one's own labor is the foundation on which our government was built," he declared.

The senator said single tax was a socialistic theory, because single tax takes the income from the land on which the value of the land depends. He said one of the purposes of the Non-Partisan league is to establish a chain of stores in Portland which would sell household necessities and farm machinery and supplies at near wholesale prices. The purpose of these stores, as represented to him, was to regulate prices in the other stores.

Senator Pierce took the Oregon legislators severely to task for the indifference which many has displayed toward true statesmanship. He referred to the marketing bill, fashioned after a similar law now in successful operation in California, which he championed in the last legislature, but which was defeated by some Portland business men.

"We must remedy these wrongs," he repeated.

Legislature Called Disgrace

"Our legislature has been a disgrace," said the senator. "I have never witnessed a crasier sight than the last one in our recent legislature. Bills were shoved through without their even having been read and senators and representatives sat there laughing and joking about it. It was a burning disgrace.

"The finger of scorn is being pointed at our legislature. These things must be corrected. They breed discontent.

The senator proposed as a remedy the split session bill which he is championing. He said he would have the legislature discuss new measures for 40 days and then adjourn for 60 days. In the meantime he would have all the bills carefully examined by five of the best lawyers in the state who would pass on their need as well as constitutionality. When the legislature would reconvene, they would be allowed to act only on the bills previously discussed and they would have to adjourn in not to exceed 10 days.

Senator Pierce closed with a strong plea for true Americanism as it was understood by the founders of the republic.
