MR. ACKERMAN MAKES DENIAL

Normal School Head Did Not Advise Teachers to Keep Away From Salem

A letter from J. H. Ackerman, president of the Oregon Normal school, was read before the Salem school board last night in which Mr. Ackerman denies that he advised teachers not to apply for positions in Salem. The letter is in reply to a letter by W. C. Winslow, chairman of the board, making inquiries about rumors which have been circulated to the effect that Mr. Ackerman has advised graduates of the normal school not to apply for positions in Salem.

Mr. Ackerman writes: "Replying to your of April 19 in which you say that a report was made to your board that I had advised graduates of Oregon Normal school not to apply for position to teach in the Salem schools, will say that there is a great mistake somewhere as I have never directly or indirectly advised our graduates not to apply for such positions, but, on the other hand, have encouraged them in season and out of season. "I therefore say in the most positive manner that I have never advised our graduates as the report indicates. It seems to me that it would be only fair to the normal school to know through what source such a report emanated. "I take this opportunity to thank you for so candidly calling my attention to the report. I assure you I appreciate it very much."

DEATH SUMMONS MRS. CREIGHTON

Member of Prominent Oregon Family Passes Away at Home in Portland

Mrs. M. J. Creighton, member of a prominent pioneer Salem family, died at her home in Portland last night after an illness of several weeks. The funeral will be held in Salem, but the time and place are to be announced later.
Mrs. Creighton leaves three daughters, Mrs. W. H. Dancy of Salem, Mrs. Jessie Jones of Waconda, widow of the late W. Al Jones, and

Miss Mabel Creighton of Portland. For a number of years Mrs. Creighton made her home in Salem. She was a daughter of the late David McCully, Oregon pioneer, who lived on Front street.

New Time Schedule Is Announced by Markets

A new schedule of opening and closing time will be put into effect in Salem the first of the coming week by a number of the meat markets. At the present time the shops

open at 7 o'clock in the morning and close at 6 p. m. every day except Saturday, when they close at 5 p. m. Under the new schedule the meat markets will open at 8 in the morning and close at 6 in the evening every day except Saturday, when the hours will be from 7 in the morning until 7 at night. Deliveries will be the same as at present, except the first, which will leave at 8:30 instead of 8.
