

ILL FEELING IS DIRECTED AT GROWERS

Censure is Heard Because of
Refusal of Berry Produc-
ers to Sell

VINE OWNERS ANSWER

Farmers Determined to De-
fend Themselves Against
General High Prices

Considerable ill feeling is being expressed on the streets and in business circles against those loganberry growers who refused the offer of 13 cents a pound made by the canners for their berries at the meeting last Saturday. But the growers offer a defense.

"There is great deal more to loganberry growing than a good many of the outsiders even dream of," said one of the growers who has been jostled from one end of the industry to the other.

"It costs about \$150 to bring an acre of loganberries to the harvesting stage," said he. "Until within the last one or two years this berry business has made little or no profits to growers. Labor usually was paid from a third to one-half of the selling price of the entire crop. We now have a chance to recover some of our losses and, as a business matter, I see no reason why we should not do this for our own protection."

Drop Next Year Possible

"No one can tell what the price

of loganberries may be next year. They may drop back to 5 cents a pound. If they do and picking remains at 3 cents we must be content with only moderate returns from our vines.

"Loganberries, I am told, should cost not to exceed 8 cents a pound if they are to be turned into the market in the form of bottled juice. Sugar must also be bought for about one-half the present price, if the cost of the drink is to be kept within the reach of the average consumer."

"Then also, it takes an average of six pounds of ripe loganberries to make one pound of the dried product. It even in cents a pound were paid to growers, the evaporated loganberry would also have to command a price in excess of what most of the consumers would be willing to pay."

Growers Should Choose
"I can not see any sound reason why the grower should even sell his loganberries at 13 cents a pound if he can get 14 or more for the berries in some other market. It would be just as reasonable to ask the refineries to sell sugar to the canners for less than the market price so that the canned loganberries can be retailed at a low price, as to expect the growers to make such a concession."

"Since neither the sugar refiners, tin can manufacturers nor labor is disposed to make any concessions in order to cheapen the canned loganberry to the consumer, it seems to me the grower has a perfect right to hold his berries for the top of the market."

"If we do not get good prices for our berries we probably could not pay the fancy prices now being asked for all kinds of goods in our retail stores. In the matter of getting high prices, everybody is doing it. Labor is included. Certainly the loganberry growers should not be expected to play the game in the inter-

Schulderman Warns Against Buying Questionable Stock

H. J. Schulderman, state corporation commissioner, yesterday made public a warning to the people of Oregon against entering into deals with foreign corporations or associations that are known as "common law trusts" or "declarations of trust." He urges that a thorough investigation first be made relative to the legal and financial status of such concerns. The warning follows the arrest in Portland Monday of two men who are charged with selling stock contrary to the provisions of the state corporation laws.

"The state has been flooded with literature from several of these concerns," said Mr. Schulderman, "and usually their agents promise to investors speedy and substantial returns. None of these companies is qualified to transact business in this state, and for that reason a careful investigation is advised."

"Because of the manner in which they have been organized most of these concerns come under the trust act, and before they can operate legally strict compliance with that act is necessary."

VETERANS' PAY TO BE CUT OFF

Major McCormack of Port-
land Not Entitled to Pen-
sion From State

Under the law, Major John F. McCormack of Portland, who for 30 years was custodian of the Multnomah county armory, cannot continue to collect \$25 a month in pension money, the general military staff of the state having no authority to authorize the payment and the secretary of state no legal right to audit the claims.

This is the holding of Attorney General Brown in answer to an inquiry submitted to him by Adjutant General George A. White. At a meeting of the general staff July 31, 1919, an order was issued that in recognition of Captain McCormack's services as custodian for over 30 years, he be promoted to the rank of major in the National guard of Oregon, and following his relief from the position that he be given one month's pay and thereafter \$25 a month until the meeting of the legislature in 1921.

In his letter to the attorney general Adjutant General White says he is unable to find any authority of law to warrant his approving the claim or for granting of pension allowances by the general staff. The only precedent bearing on the case, he finds, is the case of a man who was injured while attending encampment, and in his case an appropriation was made by the legislature. Mr. Brown says if the allowance made in the order of the general staff is not for services to be performed it would amount to a pension or gratuity and is without authority of law. If it is a just claim, the attorney general adds, it should be submitted to the legislature for action authorizing its payment.

Records in the secretary of state's office show that up to and including last September McCormack drew \$166.66 a month, or \$2000 a year. This apparently was for services. From October on, the records show, he has been drawing \$25 a month.

Kozer Not to Conduct Campaign About State

Sam A. Kozer, deputy secretary of state, and who is a candidate to succeed Ben W. Oleott as secretary, will not conduct an active campaign over the state. Mr. Kozer says that additional work in the office caused by the publication of voter's pamphlets and the assembling of election supplies for the counties, also recent changes in the office force make it imperative for him to remain at his desk.

"It will be impossible for me to conduct an active campaign over the state," said Mr. Kozer. "I regret that it will be impossible for me to visit every county as I should like to do and present my candidacy for secretary of state personally to the Republican voters of Oregon."

"By reason of recent changes in the office force and sickness in the family of one of the clerks engaged in important work, close application to my duties has been necessary. The approaching primary and special elections also increase the volume of official work in the office. With me the business of the state comes first and my candidacy must receive secondary consideration. I am therefore relying upon correspondence and the active assistance of my many friends in the campaign I am conducting."

Printing of Briefs to Cost More, Court Rules

The state supreme court yesterday ordered a change in the rules allowing an increase in the cost of printing briefs from \$1 to \$1.25 a page.

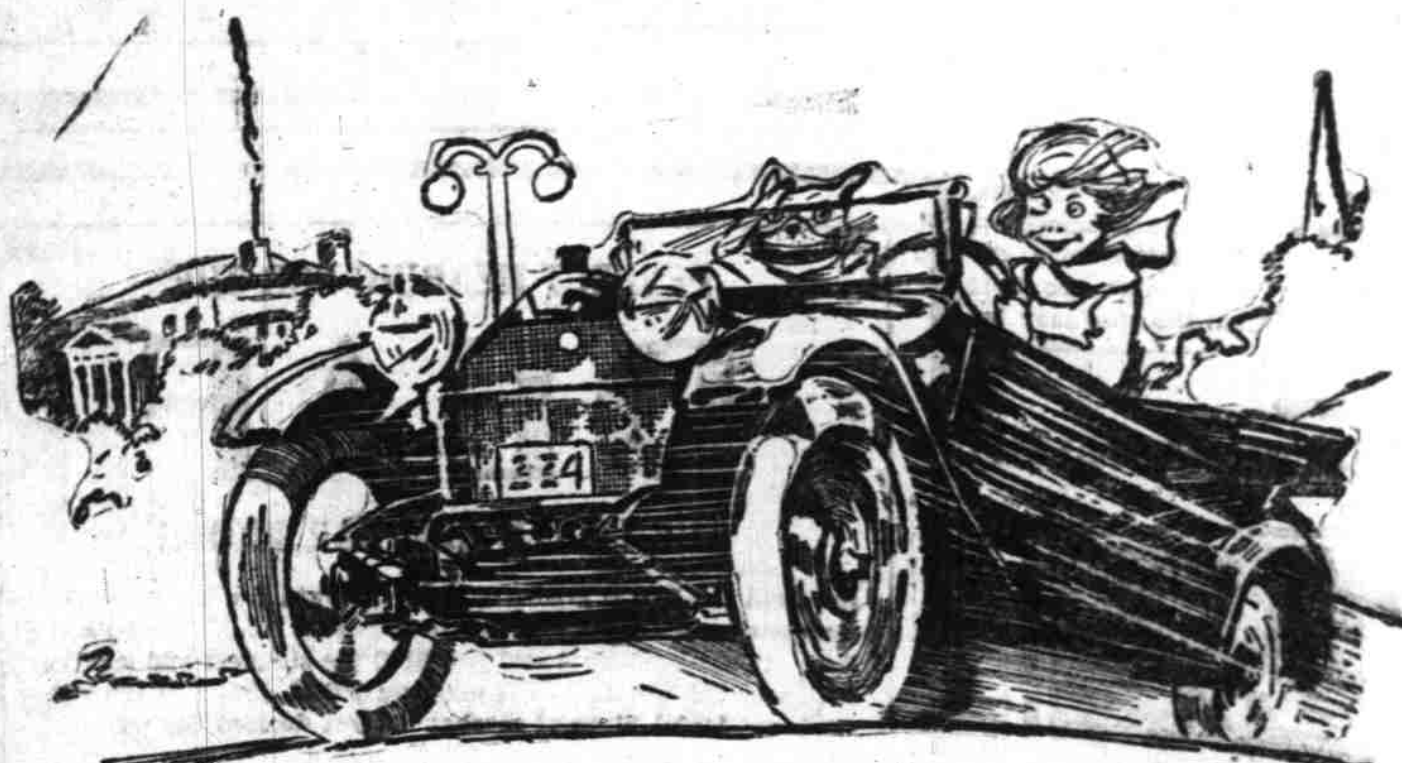
