Valley Phone Companies Ask for Higher Rates

Four hearings, all dealing with applications for increased rates by some of the smaller telephone systems of the Willamette valley, have been set by the public service commission for the early part of May. They are lines that originally were included in a blanket application that was filed with the commission by Jay Bowerman, an attorney for the telephone companies, seeking an increase in rates that would place them on a parity with the rates charged by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.

Under the law the commission could not consider the applications in blanket form. It is understood that Mr. Bowerman does not represent the companies that have now filed individually.

The four hearings, all on the subject of increased rates, are scheduled as follows: May 10, at Sherwood, rates of Sherwood Telephone company. May 10, at Newberg, rates of Newberg Telephone company. May 11, at Silverton, Interurban Telephone company. May 12, at Lebanon, rates of Lebanon Mutual Telephone company.
