"THERE WILL BE NO BAND-WAGON CANDIDATE AT CHICAGO"

"My Dear Editor:

"There will be no 'band-wagon' candidate in the Republican Convention at Chicago.

Whatever is happening in darkest Siberia, it is safe to predict that when the curtain is raised it will be shown that Japan has more than a toe-hold there. She will have a firm foothold. That is Japan's way. And who is there to blame the prolific race that must swarm or starve?

Charles R. Crane, the newly-appointed ambassador to China, is out in an interview extolling China. This is the same statesman who was selected by President Taft and ordered back home before he could sail from San Francisco to his post because he talked too much. But, as he is praising China, it will be all right this time.

The complete working out of an air service from Cairo to Cape Town is announced by the English government. When Cecil Rhodes was but 22 years of age, 40 years ago, he conceived the idea that Africa should be dominated by Great Britain and spent his life working to that end. Vonders had been accomplished when he died in 1902.

THE DISCONTENTED.

The new Liberal party expects to put a full ticket in the field in Missouri and several other states. The party is made up of the radicals and discontented of other organizations. It will swallow the Nonpartisan League if possible and will enlist the support of labor and the Communists. The single-taxers and Socialists are to be included—in fact, any man with a wild idea and a grudge against the Republican or Democratic organization will be given the right hand of fellowship and a front seat. Whether a fellow wants to blow up the government with dynamite or a bicycle pump, he will be made welcome. If he can raise his voice better than his arm he will still be a desirable. Some one suggests that this would be a fine party for Hiram Johnson, who is also an arch-apostle of discontent. He can have the nomination if he will but say the word.

JOHNSON CANNOT WIN.

There is nothing but stimulus and encouragement for the loyal Hoover workers of California in the results of the direct primary elections in the group of middle west states that became notorious during the war by reason of the disloyalty of their heavy foreign-born populations. Senator Johnson has not carried a state to date that was not disgraced by riots against the enforcement of the conscription act and by pacifist demonstrations; and, what is equally significant, he has not received a majority of the Republican votes—or anything near a majority in any state that he has carried.

In Michigan Senator Johnson received 156,939 votes in the presidential preference primary; General Wood received 112,556 votes; Governor Lowden received 62,418; Hoover received 52,503 votes; General Pershing, 17,971 votes. Senator Johnson made his appeal to the pro-German, pro-Russian and radical electors; and they voted for him en masse. He told the pro-Germans the peace treaty was unjust. He told the Pro-Russians that this government should have recognized the Bolshevik government as soon as it was in temporary power. He would have had the white hand of the Goddess of Liberty clasp the blood-stained fingers of Lenin and Trotsky. He told the radicals that the campaign of the department of justice against Bolshevism was an attempt at class tyranny. He told the Plumb plan leaguers that he favored government ownership of the railroads. He figured that if he could capitalize the discontent in Michigan he could win against a divided opposition. He won; but the price of that victory was to carry the brand of the only candidate in either party who is bidding for radical and pro-German support.

That no candidate wearing such a brand can win in the Republican convention is self-evident. The Republican party has not gone Bolshevik and is not likely to do so. Senator Johnson's success in Nebraska was obtained under similar conditions. In Nebraska 34,000 men registered for the primaries this year giving Germany as their birthplace. Senator Johnson's vote, as reported by the Associated Press on Friday, was 41,753. He won in the

direct primary because the loyal Republican vote was divided between General Wood and General Pershing. General Wood carried one congressional district and the delegates from that district have announced that they will vote for him in the convention.

In the middle west there are four states that, by reason of their large foreign population, are known as the Bolshevik group. They are Michigan, Wisconsin, Nebraska and North Dakota. They all have direct primaries; for the very reason that in a direct primary the foreign element can combine against a divided opposition and win by a majority vote. Johnson carried three states of this group and La Follette the other. Neither of them has carried a single state elsewhere.

THE DIVINE SARAH.

Sarah Bernhardt, at the age of 80, is threatening another farewell tour of America this fall. If Sarah needs the money it would be better to pass the hat and let the Americans remember her, as she was. She doesn't have to stage a come-back. As an octogenarian with one leg she should prefer to cherish the past rather than trade upon the future.

ELECTION FUNDS.

Senator Borah's "reform bill" provides that not more than \$10,000 shall be spent in any one state on behalf of a candidate in a presidential primary. This, however, does not include the personal expenses of the candidate, which might in some cases run up to almost as much more. But at \$10,000 to a state a man could blow in a million dollars and still not cut much of a figure.

It is hardly fair to put the states on an equal basis as to the amount of money to be expended. With \$10,000 a candidate could give the Nevada voters almost a dollar apiece, while in New York he couldn't even send them a postal card. Why not do away with the freak presidential primary altogether and save the money and honor of everybody?

STILL RUNNING.

The Socialists are once more going to nominate Eugene Debs for president; but how can a man run with a ball and chain on his leg?

After all, Mitchell Palmer is the most promising candidate the Democrats can offer. Half a dozen times he promised to reduce the high cost of living and the dog-gone thing makes him keep on promising.

HUNT FOR HARMONY.

James Hamilton Lewis, who is a Democratic candidate for the nomination for the vice presidency, has been making a tour of the east. He must have looked upon the cola when it was moving itself aright, judging from some of the things he reports. He says that in New England the Republican leaders have a harmony program to present. They want a combination of Lodge for president and Lowden for vice president. They say that Lodge represents the Republican majority idea on the League of Nations, while Lowden stands for business security. It also would put Massachusetts and Illinois on the ticket together for the first time in history.

But Lewis saw something different in New York.

There, he says, he found a number of Republican leaders who wanted to make up a ticket with Justice Charles E. Hughes for president and Hiram Johnson for vice president. They charge that Johnson defeated Hughes in 1916, and if he expects to be recognized as a decent Republican now he would turn in and help elect him. Johnson is recognized as a radical, but as vice president could not be very dangerous.

It was prophesied in New York that Hughes would be nominated through the influence of union labor.

BISCUITS, BUNS and ROLLS

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

BISCUIT! What delectable! So tender they fairly melt in the mouth, and of such glorious flavor that the appetite is never satisfied. These are the kind of biscuits anyone can make with Royal Baking Powder and these unusual recipes.

Biscuits

2 cups flour
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup milk or half milk and half water

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add shortening and rub in very lightly; add liquid slowly; roll or pat on floured board to about one inch in thickness (handle as little as possible); cut with biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven 15 to 20 minutes.

Royal Cinnamon Buns

2 1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
2 tablespoons shortening
1 egg
1/4 cup water
1/4 cup sugar
2 teaspoons cinnamon
4 tablespoons seeded raisins

Sift 2 tablespoons of measured sugar with flour, salt and baking powder; rub shortening in lightly; add beaten egg to water and add slowly. Roll out 1/4 inch

thick on floured board; brush with melted butter, sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Roll as for jelly roll; cut into 1/4 inch pieces; place with cut edges up on well-greased pan; sprinkle with a little sugar and cinnamon. Bake in moderate oven 30 to 35 minutes; remove from pan at once.

Parker House Rolls

4 cups flour
1 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
2 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cups milk

Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Add melted shortening to milk and add slowly to dry ingredients stirring until smooth. Knead lightly on floured board and roll out 1/4 inch thick. Cut with biscuit cutter. Grease each circle with back of knife one side of center. Butter the small section and fold larger part well over the small. Place one inch apart on greased pan. Allow to stand 15 minutes in warm place. Brush each with melted butter and bake in moderate oven 15 to 20 minutes.

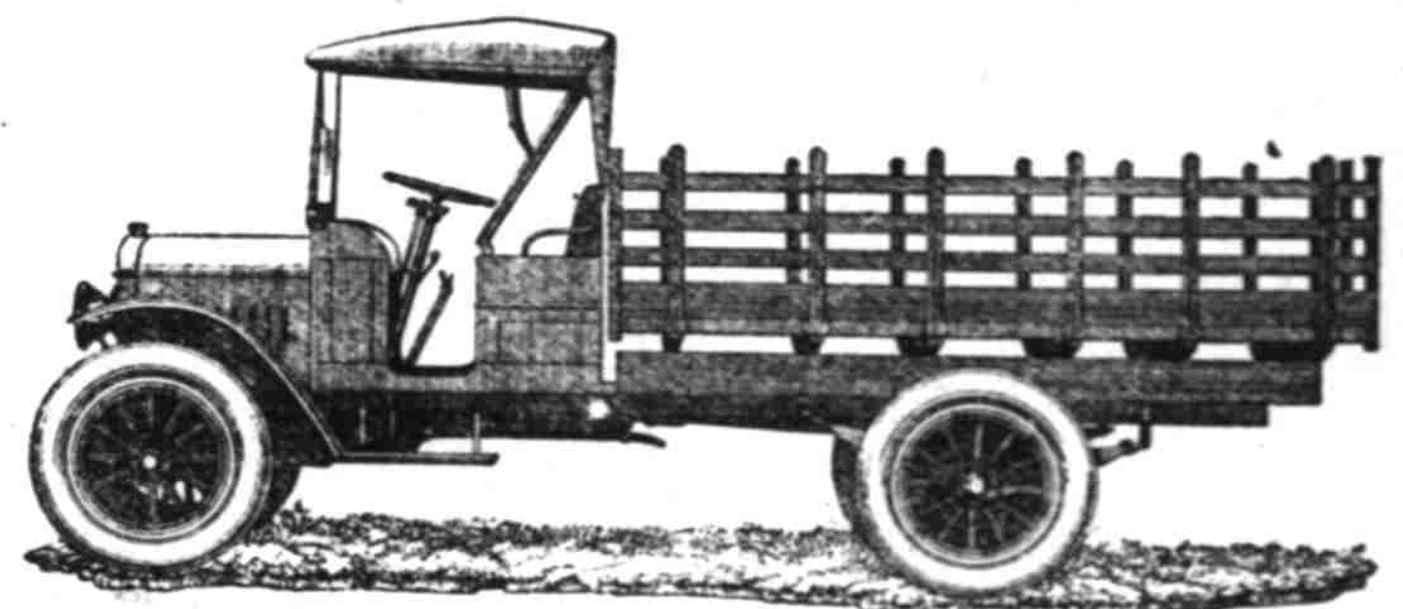
