

STAFRIN'S WORK PLEASES OLCOTT

Letter of Commendation Sent by Governor to Retiring Official

WORKS OF ART WILL BE SHOWN SALEM PUBLIC

Arts League Perfects Plans to Bring Notable Display Here Next Month
NO FEE FOR ADMISSION
Works Familiar to Connoisseurs Included in List for Exhibition

Adding to the already impressive list of worth while things sponsored by it this year, the Salem Arts League has plans carefully perfected for bringing to Salem the most notable examples of the work of artists of the northwest, which was exhibited through April, in Portland, at the Art museum, and known as the "Eighth Annual Exhibition of the Work of the Artists of the Pacific Northwest."

The sample room of the Hotel Marlton has been secured and the exhibit will cover a period of three days, May 12, 13 and 14.

An imposing group of names will figure in the exhibit, foremost being that of Paul Morgan Gustin, of Seattle, who will send three lectures, "The Eastern Autumn," "New England Village" and "Nooka Indians," a painting of Nooka sound, on the ocean coast of Vancouver Island, where Spanish and English ships often met in the years 1775-95. Mr. Gustin is not only recognized as a foremost western artist, but his work has been prominent in eastern and southern exhibitions, including the Biennial of American Paintings, Coeur d'Alene gallery, Washington, D. C., Chicago Art Institute, Pennsylvania academy, Philadelphia; Fine Arts palace, P. P. I. E. San Francisco, where he was a member of the jury of selectmen. He was also a jury member of the Chicago Art Institute Annual American paintings in 1915; a winner of the \$100 special prize, at the Seattle Fine Arts exhibit in 1914; first prize S. F. A. S. in 1919 and silver medal A. Y. P.

Miss Charlotte Mish of Portland will be represented by her splendid painting "In The Studio," which attracted so much attention at the Portland exhibit.

Prof. Alfred H. Schreff of the School of Fine Arts of the University of Oregon will send several of his water colors, and Mrs. Schreff, who is widely known as a miniature painter will lend some of the best specimens of her work. She is at present in Portland where she is working on numerous commissions, the proceeds of which are going to the woman's building on the university campus.

The officials of the league are pleased with the loan of Melville T. Wire of Oregon City. He has exhibited several times in Portland, and had three of his canvasses hung in the arm room of the Oregon building at the Panama exposition.

J. Marion Crook of Astoria, who conducted a studio for a short time in Salem, is another whose work is well known here. He will send besides the pictures exhibited in Portland several water colors.

Several paintings by Henry Wentz of Portland will augment the list of notable work. Other names will be announced later. R. Meyer Gilbert is the only local artist whose work was included in the exhibition just closed in Portland, and he will also have work on display here.

Another feature of the Salem exhibit, and one of great importance in itself will be the showing of the work of famous artists, which the officials of the league are now soliciting from local connoisseurs. A number of paintings by the old masters are to be found in Salem, and the owners have shown a decided willingness to lend them for the forthcoming exhibit, so that local art lovers may have an opportunity of studying them.

The pictures will be adequately protected both by insurance and personal supervision during the time that the league is responsible for them and although the organization is at considerable expense in bringing the display to Salem, the exhibit will be open to the public entirely without charge.

WILLAMETTE U IS ENDORSED

Commercial Club Directors Unanimous in Support of Fund Campaign

Willamette university's campaign for \$100,000 for the completion of the new Lausanne hall and the rebuilding of Walter hall, following an address by Joseph H. Albert and on Motion of Frederick Schmidt, received the endorsement of the board of directors of the Salem Commercial club at a meeting last night at the Spa. Embodied in the motion is a recommendation that the people of Salem support the campaign.

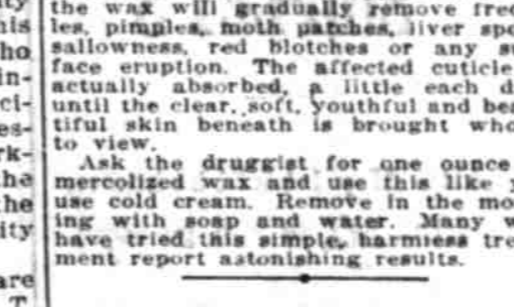
Mr. Albert showed that since its foundation Willamette university has brought into Salem \$8,000,000 or \$10,000,000, most of that amount in recent years, and that the institution has been responsible for a big increase in the city's population. There was no opposition to the endorsement.

Mr. Schmidt called the board's attention to a conversation of mail carriers which is to be held in Salem June 26. The question of helping to finance the entertainment of the visitors for that occasion was referred and probably will be acted upon favorably.

R. W. Macy, city attorney, was summoned to the meeting to explain the proposed charter amendments that are to go before the people of the city at the special election on May 21, and emphasized the proposed measure to change the method of assessment for the paving of street intersections. The club is asked by Mayor Wilson to name a committee of representative citizens of Salem to sign the argument in behalf of the measures that will appear in the voters' pamphlet and this committee will be appointed by President Paulsen of the club. The other amendment is that providing for an increase in the pay of the chief of police from \$1200 to \$1500 a year. Representatives of the two Salem newspapers and of the Oregonian, Journal and Telegram of Portland were guests of the directors last night.
