TAFT'S SUBJECT IS VOTED UPON

Willamette Students Would
Have Him Talk on League
of Nations

Ex-President William H. Taft, who is to lecture at the Salem armory on May 29, submitted three subjects to the Taft management from which it will choose the topic of his lecture. At the chapel hour on Friday a straw ballot was taken among the students to determine their choice in the matter.

The subjects suggested by Mr. Taft are all very interesting and the returns of the ballot show the deep interest of the students of Willamette in international affairs. The following were the topics suggested: "The League of Nations Up-to-Date," "Americanism and Bolshevism," "Capital, Labor and Soviet." Of the three "The League of Nations Up-to-Date" won a 51 per cent vote of those voting. "Capital, Labor and the Soviet" received 31 per cent, while "Americanism and Bolshevism" received only 18 per cent.

A straw ballot of the wish of the public is being taken through the local papers, but the returns are not yet determined. Announcement as to the definite choice will be published later.

Since Mr. Taft is holding himself free from politics and is coming under the auspices of the Ellison-White Lyceum bureau, it is a rare privilege for the voting public to hear him at this critical time on the most vital issues of the day.
