Champoeg Celebration Set for Next Saturday

Under the auspices of the Oregon Pioneer association and the Oregon Historical society, the 77th anniversary and the 20th annual celebration of "Founders' day" will be observed at Champoeg Saturday of this week. Judge P. M. D'Arcy of Salem, pioneer of 1857 and past president of the Oregon Pioneer association, will preside.

From 10:30 to 12:30 o'clock a basket dinner and exchange of greetings will be in order and this will be followed by a program to begin at 1:15 p. m. with the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by the Veteran quartet, composed of W. M. Morse, Dr. J. E. Hall, H. W. Mills and Professor Z. M. Parvin. Other features of the program will be an invocation, informal addresses, songs by the quartet, etc. Speeches will be limited to five minutes.

For the first time in some years it will be impossible to run a boat from Portland for the celebration, but this is not expected to detract from the attendance.

Master Plumbers Meeting to Bring Big Attendance

 "I know of no official in the northwest who has been threatened," said Mr. Saunders, "and I do not look for any disturbance in Tacoma."
 "In Seattle, however, I believe some demonstration has been planned but I have nothing to announce on this tonight, although there may be developments tomorrow."
 Stickers had been placed in a Seattle building, Mr. Saunders stated.

Federal authorities, he said, were investigating.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., April 29.—Federal and state officials today were searching the mining communities of this section for the persons who for the past several nights, have plastered the dead walls of Marion county with radical literature issued by what purported to be the "American anarchist federated laborists" and entitled "The Anarchist Soviet Bulletin." The handbill, which calls upon workers to rise and seize all factories and food supplies, made its appearance in Mannington, Homewood, Sycamore, Downs and other towns the same night and the next night another poster appeared in a number of other towns.

Large numbers of foreign-born miners are employed in this part of West Virginia where last winter the federal authorities carried on a systematic search for radicals.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 29.—Stickers, posters and circulars printed in red ink and purporting to be signed by the Communist labor party and urging an "international labor day" strike on May 1, have been freely distributed in Spokane, according to police reports. No other activities have been reported.
