Independents Have Right to Vote on Measures

Any registered voter, regardless of whether he is affiliated with any political party, will be able to vote on the referendum measures at the special election May 21. This is the information furnished by Attorney General Brown to W. J. Kerr, president of Oregon Agricultural college, in response to an inquiry from Mr. Kerr. Because of the large number of inquiries received from persons interested in the millage tax measures the question was referred to the attorney general so that a public statement might be made for the general enlightenment of the voters. Under the primary law persons

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registered as independents are unable to vote for candidates for nomination by any political party, but while the special election takes place at the same time as the primary election and the voting places and the officials are the same the referendum measures are printed on separate ballots and independently registered person may vote.



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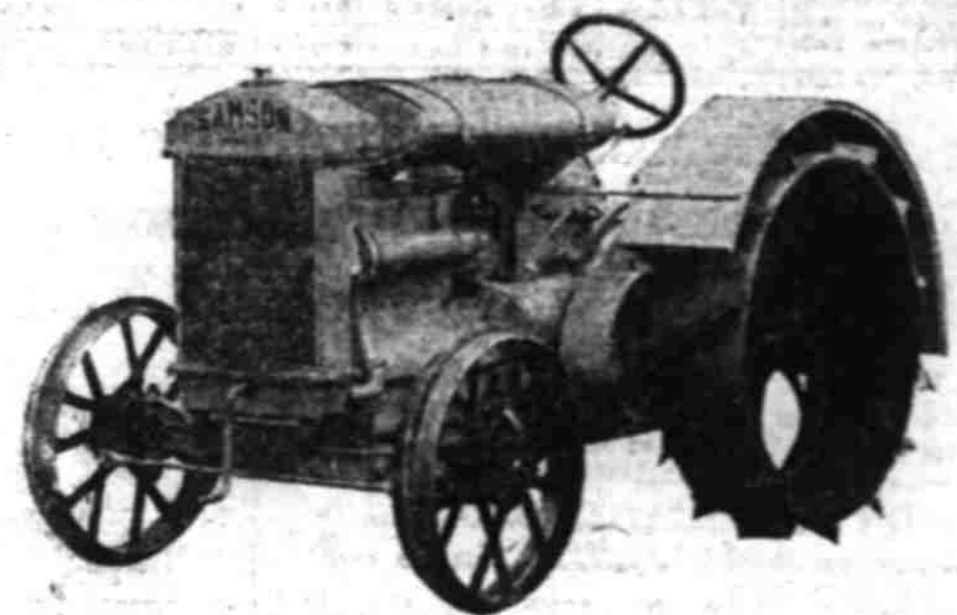
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
