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#### A DRUG GARDEN ON EVERY SALEM DISTRICT FARM

If the average reader is of the same mind with the writer, he Four delegates pledged to Wood will see more in the idea of drug gardens for the Salem district than he thought possible-

If he will read carefully all the Salem Slogan matter in this issue of The Statesman.

Take cascara sagrada-no pun intended.

Away back in 1909, when Bulletin No. 139 of the United States Department of Agriculture was published, on "American Medicinal Barks," according to the author of that official publication, 2,000,-000 pounds of cascara sagrada bark was being used in the world, and 100,000 trees, yielding 1,000,000 pounds of the bark, were being destroyed.

The world has got to have cascara sagrada.

There is nothing to take its place.

Western Oregon is its home. Salem is its chief market center.

So cascara sagrada trees must be planted. They may occupy the waste places on the farms.

They will yield an annual crop of bark, with scientific harvesting; and it will always be valuable.

So with the Oregon grape—the official state flower, the official state blood purifier, and at the same time a basis for making preserves and cooling drinks. There is beauty and several kinds of utility com-

Oregon mint is taking its rightful place at the head of the class for the whole world-and the menthol of commerce, made from the Oregon kind of mint, is growing in demand by leaps and bounds, for use in the drug trade and the confectionery and gum and other trades. .

We can furnish digitalis enough to heal all the broken hearts of the world.

Note what Prof. A. Ziefle says.

He is the dean of the School of Pharmacy of the Oregon Agricultural College.

He says drugs could be grown here at one-tenth the expense and twice the yield that they can be in Michigan and Minnesota. The great drug gardens of the United States are in those states.

This Salem Slogan issue on a Drug Garden is in a large measure introductory. It is mainly suggestive. It is aimed at getting our farmers to thinking and investigating along this line.

The result is sure to be the development of very profitable lines

of agriculture.

The thing for them to do, first, is to follow the lines of least resistance-to produce the drugs most needed and best adapted to our section, and selling for the highest prices in the surest markets.

The Salem Slogan subject for next week will be Sugar Beets. All our farmers should raise at least a few sugar beets; try them out; make their own sugar beet syrup for their home consumption; and prepare the way to cut loose from the Mormon beet sugar trust that, with the other sugar trusts, is robbing the people of this country of a billion dollars this year.
