Divorce Is Denied—
The divorce case of J. F. Day vs. Lenora Day, which Judge G. G. Bingham has had under advisement since Monday, when the case was tried, was dismissed yesterday. Day charged his wife with extreme cruelty. The conclusion of the court makes observation that while the defendant may have used strong and forceful language in opposing the plaintiff's conduct, such was provoked by the attention which the plaintiff was paying to other women than his wife. The court decrees that the plaintiff is not entitled to a divorce and orders judgment in favor of Mrs. Day, and that the plaintiff pay the costs of the suit.
