

FISHERMEN AND FARMERS WORRY ABOUT SHORTAGE

Frantic Appeals Are Made to Governor to Waive Gasoline Requirement

TRACTORS STOP WORK

Messages Referred by Executive to Conference Held in Portland

The fishing industry on the Columbia river will be tied up and farming operations in western Oregon will be seriously handicapped unless there is a relief from the gasoline shortage, declare appeals that were received yesterday by Governor Olcott from Astoria and The Dalles. Governor Olcott said that doubtless the conference in Portland yesterday attended by O. F. Hoff, state treasurer and state sealer of weights and measures, W. A. Datzel, deputy state sealer, and representatives of the fuel companies, will reach a decision to waive for a time the operation of the law requiring a specific gravity of 56 for gasoline used in the state.

Astoria Chamber Protests
The petition from Astoria is headed by the Astoria Chamber of Commerce and reads:
"Important you act immediately on gasoline shortage by discontinuing enforcement gasoline gravity law until legislature meets in January."

Astoria has less than five days' supply on hand. The enforcement of the law means that fishing and canning will stop on the river by tying up about 3000 fish boats and all canning trollers. We ask your immediate action to relieve the situation so that we can use same grades as Washington and other coast states.

Elmore & Co., Tallant Grant Packing company, Booth Fisheries, Union Fisheries Co-operative Packing company, Barley Fish company, Columbia River Fish company, Warren Packing company, Altoona Packing company.

A telegram from T. A. Sammis, Jr., at The Dalles, in charge of the fourth district for the state board of horticulture, says tractors are laid up for lack of gasoline and plowing is being held up. "We are better off with low gravity gasoline than without any. Can you give us relief," says the telegram.

Joseph Roman of Astoria, member of the legislature, called the governor's attention by telephone to the acute situation there.
All the information and petitions received by the governor yesterday were transmitted to the conference in Portland.

The Knights of Columbus team from Portland was able to find Cole for safe hits only twice in the game at Oxford park Sunday and the Salem Senators won by a score of 12 to 0. Cole pitched a brilliant game throughout and struck out nine of the visitors. Both the Knights' hits were made by Barr.

The Salem players negotiated 13 hits and the visitors were forced to use three pitchers, none of whom could keep the ball out of the way of the Salem bats.

The score hardly gives an estimate of the strength of the visiting team, most of whom were clever players who made a good impression

on the crowd. They are under the management of Bart Coffey.

Methodists Will Have Out-door Meeting Place
The Methodist church will establish a camp ground at Wallowa, lake, in Wallowa county, for the purpose of holding camp meetings, and articles of association were filed here yesterday for that purpose by the Methodist Camping Ground association of Eastern Oregon. The property valuation is \$1000 and the signers of the articles are Ira R. Aldrich, C. L. Walker and N. Sherman Hawk. Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday by the Stage Gulch Telephone line, having headquarters at Pendleton. The incorporators are V. F. Moore, C. F. Bloom and W. L. Creswell, and the capitalization is \$1600.

Resolutions increasing capital stock were filed by the L. B. Menefee Lumber company of Portland, from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000; by the Bend Juniper Products company of Bend, from \$5000 to \$50,000, and by the Jacobsen-Jensen company of Portland from \$25,000 to \$75,000. The Northwest Fruit exchange, a foreign concern incorporated under the laws of New Jersey, filed papers showing an increase in capitalization from \$100,000 to \$200,000.

Resolutions of dissolution were filed by the Hampton Livestock company of Bend.

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Sublimity Woman Believed to Have Committed Suicide

Mrs. Albert Frank, for years a resident of the Sublimity neighborhood, apparently committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid some time between 8 o'clock Saturday morning and late Saturday night. The body was found by searchers about 1 o'clock Sunday morning in a thicket about a mile from her home. Information of the suicide was received by Sheriff Needham and Coroner Clough yesterday. The coroner said no inquest would be held. Mrs. Frank left her home early Saturday morning to go to the home

of neighbors, and when she had not returned by early afternoon her husband became alarmed and a searching party was organized. The woman had been in good health and not despondent, and the husband knows of no reason for the suicide. Mrs. Frank leaves besides her husband, four children, the youngest of whom is 14.
