

PLAN ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION

President Held Responsible for Treaty Failure by McCumber

WASHINGTON, May 11.—Opposition fire was opened today in the senate on the Republican peace resolution, Senator McCumber of North Dakota, Republican, a member of the foreign relations committee, delivering the first salvo. Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, the administration spokesman, will follow tomorrow.

row, and there were no indications of a prolonged debate. When Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, Republican leader, called upon the resolution today and announced that it would be pressed continually, Senator Underwood of Alabama, Democratic leader, state that while most of the Democrats would "resist" the resolution, there would be no obstruction nor many speeches. Senator McCumber opposed both senate and house resolutions. Both he declared, would bring dishonor upon the United States by a desertion of the allies. As a substitute, he urged his resolution to restore commercial relations with Germany, but conceded that it had no chance of adoption because he said the "lines of division between the two factions of this body have been cemented by partisanship and hardened by time."

Multnomah county's total registration is 117,153, its Republican registration 83,399, and its Democratic registration 27,918.
Marion county is second in the list with a total registration of 18,708, of which 13,459 are Republicans, 4,929 Democrats and 1229 miscellaneous.
The secretary of state's office is now engaged in mailing out a larger number of voters' pamphlets than was ever before mailed out prior to an election. This is because of the consolidation of the special and the primary elections.
"By the close of the present week there will have been mailed to the registered voters of the state 683,293 pamphlets, of which 346,319 are copies of the proposed constitutional amendments and measures referred to the people at the special general election May 21, 1920, and 228,571 are copies of the various pamphlets containing the Republican candidates' statements, and 93,405 are copies of the various pamphlets containing the statements of Democratic candidates who are up for nomination at the primary election May 21, 1920," said Mr. Kozer.
Postage Bill Breaks Record.
"This is by far the greatest number of pamphlets mailed to the registered voters of the state prior to any election held in Oregon up to this time. The postage charge for forwarding this mail matter will amount to \$5748.90. In order to expedite the mailing of the pamphlets going to the registered Republicans and Democrats, has been included a pamphlet copy of the various constitutional amendments and measures. To the other registered voters who are not members of these parties only pamphlet copies of the proposed constitutional amendments and measures were mailed, as they do not participate in either the Republican or Democratic primaries.
"In order to edit, print, bind and mail these pamphlets within the very limited time which the law provides, it has been necessary to work and operate the state printing plant to its fullest capacity day and night since April 18."

DECORATING IS LECTURE TOPIC

Mrs. Wilmot, New York Professional, Gives Audience Valuable Hints

Mrs. Grace R. Wilmot of New York city spoke to a large number of Salem people last night in the public library on interior decorating. Mrs. Wilmot is a professional interior decorator of New York and is lecturing over the United States for the government. Her talk was addressed to people whose income is \$5000 or less annually.
Mrs. Wilmot first spoke of standardizing decorating. She said that every country except the United States has a distinctive art, and that until now the United States has been content to draw from other fields.
"Interior decorating is more than simply beautifying the home," she said. "It is the making of a background fitting the individual in that home. Line, color and form are essentials. Beauty is simplicity."
"Since the war so many foreigners have come to America to live and they look up to the Americans for their ideals, hence the duty of each American is to educate them through our homes."
"Sacrament of religion is but the outward growth of inward purity and sacrament of art is but the expression of inward beauty," said Mrs. Wilmot, declaring that the homes should be full of expression of beauty. She said white must be eliminated from all interior decoration, as it is not a color. Color is essential in all interior decorating, and suggestions should be taken from nature.
Background is essential, she said, and the most important thing in the room is the wall, with the windows next. These should be neutral and the color should be gotten from flowers, a single picture or vase. She also told the danger of getting things too languid. Furnishings should be selected to suit one's self.
In closing she said: "If we are to have a nation of artists and art lovers, we should bring our children into artistic homes, for this inherent love of beauty is just as essential as the baby grows up as proper sanitation. A child can become as much contaminated by ugliness as by unwholesome surroundings."

Petition Circulators Demand Ten Cents Name

PORTLAND, Or., May 11.—Portland was confronted with a new strike situation today. It is that of the petition circulators, who demand that they be paid ten cents for each name they secure on various petitions they may be circulating. The rate has been five cents per signature. Each name they secure to petitions must be certified to, and those which have not the certificates are not paid for.

Kansas Girl Admits Murder of Relatives

SALINA, Kas., May 11.—Miss Stella Hyman, 29 years old, today confessed that she had killed her brother-in-law and her sister, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bunch, and had administered poison to their daughter, last August at Lincoln Center, near here, according to the county attorney.
In her statement, the county attorney said, Miss Hyman said she placed fly poison in the coffee and other food that the Bunchs drank and ate. Her motive for the crime, she said to have said, was that she was the mother of a child of which Lee Bunch, a son of the couple she killed, was the father, and that his parents would not let him marry her. She said also that her sister and brother-in-law abused her. Miss Hyman said she poisoned Mrs. Bunch first. After his return from the funeral, Mr. Bunch continued to abuse

her and threatened her with a revolver, she said.
"I thought I might as well kill him as to have him kill me, her statement said in explaining the poisoning of Bunch.
Nancy Bunch, the daughter, still is confined to her bed because of the poison and her physicians say she will be an invalid permanently.
Both Miss Hyman and Lee Bunch are being held in jail here pending a further investigation.

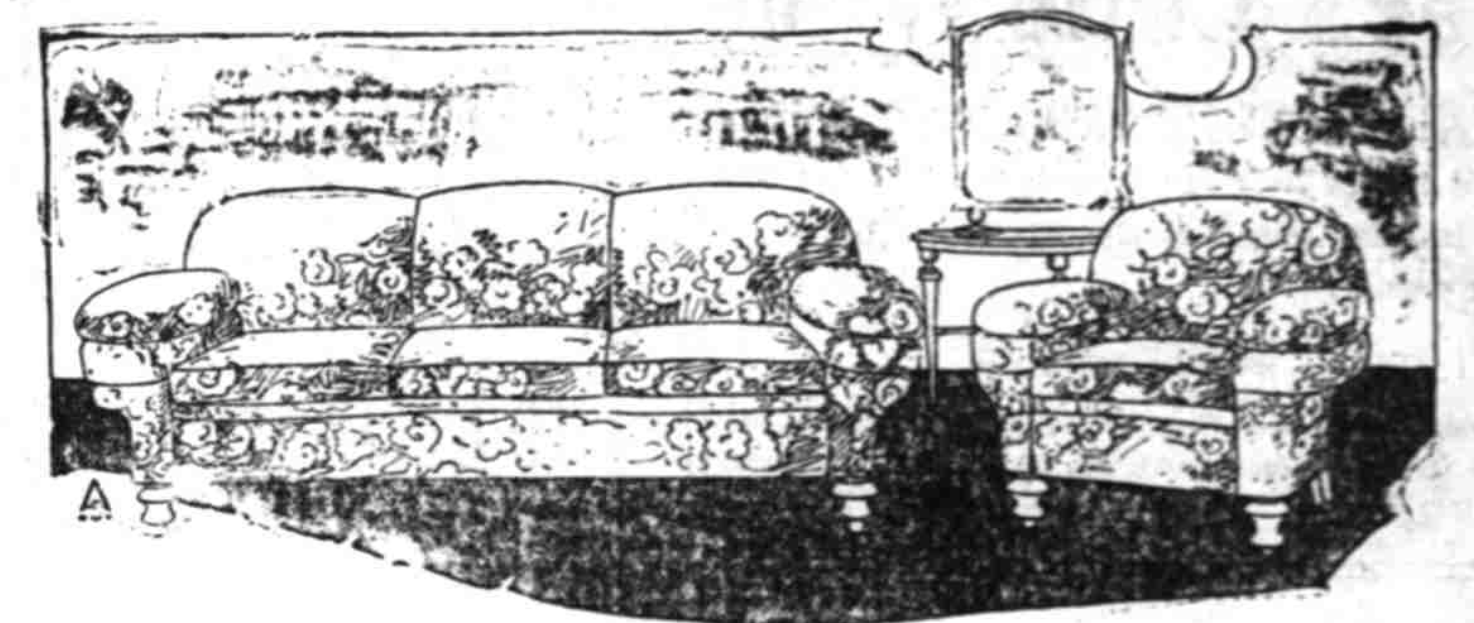
