OFFICIAL HOME, BONDS UNLOCKED

Flurry of Excitement Caused by Richardson's Jaunt to Wyoming

Joseph G. Richardson, assistant state treasurer returned to Salem yesterday and was unable to unlock the safe containing certain bonds which the grand jury was desirous to ascertain to a certainty were in the treasurer's possession before the recent report on investigation of the treasurer's office.

COOKIES and SMALL CAKES

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

WHEN the children romp in, hungry as young bears, here are some wholesome, economical delights that will not only be received with glee, but will satisfy the most ravenous appetite in a most wholesome manner.

Cookies
1 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract or
1 teaspoon rind of 1 lemon
4 cups flour
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk to beaten eggs and beat again; add slowly to creamed shortening and sugar; add nutmeg and flavoring; add 3 cups flour sifted with baking powder; add enough more flour to make stiff dough. Roll out very thin on floured board; cut with cookie cutter, sprinkle with sugar, or put a raisin or a piece of English walnut in the center of each. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven.

Cocoa Drop Cakes
4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup milk
1 cup flour
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup cocoa
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten eggs; beat well and add milk slowly; sift flour, baking powder, salt and cocoa into mixture; stir until smooth, add vanilla. Put one tablespoon of batter into each greased muffin tin and bake in moderate oven about 20 minutes. Cover with boiled icing.

Orange Cakes
4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup milk
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon orange extract
1/2 cup rind of 1 orange
Cream shortening; add sugar slowly, beating well; add milk a little at a time; then add well-beaten eggs; sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to mixture; add flavoring and grated orange rind; mix well. Bake in greased shallow tin, or individual cake tins, in hot oven 15 to 20 minutes. When cool cover with orange icing.

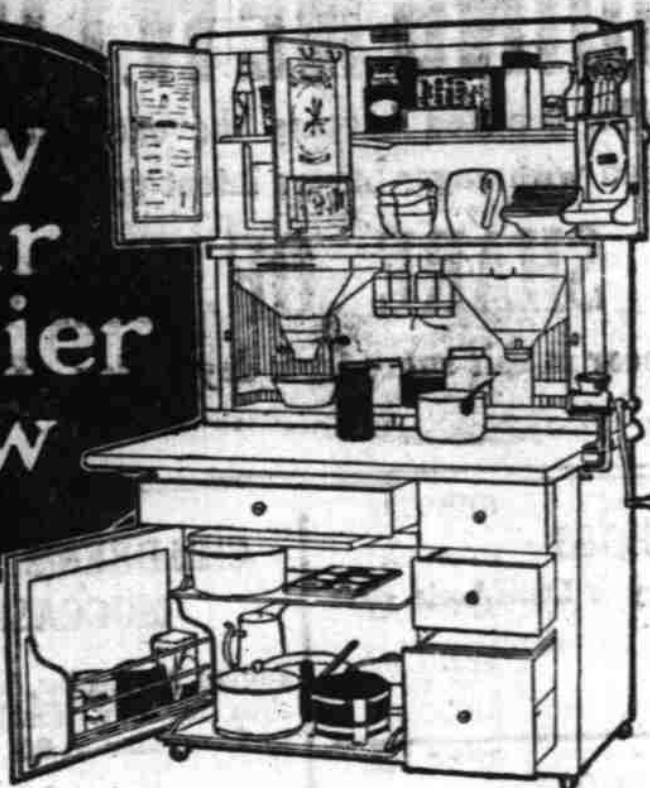
