Fire Losses Are Totaled by Marshal A. C. Barber

Fire losses in Oregon during the month of April, outside of Portland, aggregated \$149,515, according to the monthly statement issued yesterday by A. C. Barber, state fire marshal.

The heaviest loss was a lumber plant at North Bend that burned with a loss of \$120,000.

First Mortgage Bonds to Build Temple of Labor

The Portland Co-operative Labor Temple association was yesterday granted a permit by Corporation Commissioner Schulerdman to sell \$200,000 first mortgage bonds, to be issued against property of the association at North Bend and Jefferson streets.

The proceeds will be used for the construction of a labor temple at a cost of about \$250,000. The officers are O. R. Hartwig, president; Frank Hannan, vice president, and E. J. Stack, secretary.
