Want Seattle Democrats

Removed From Office

SPOKANE, Wash., May 12.—Demand has been made on the administration at Washington for the removal from office of United States District Attorney Robert C. Drumheller, of Seattle, Roscoe C. Drumheller, collector of the port of Seattle, and David J. Williams, internal revenue collector at Tacoma. It became known tonight in correspondence made public here by George Christensen of Seattle, chairman of the Democratic state central committee. Telegrams demanding the removal of the three officials were sent last week to Attorney General Palmer, superior officer of District Attorney Saunders, and to Secretary of the Treasury Houston, to whom Messrs. Drumheller and Williams are responsible. The action is the outgrowth of the conventions two weeks ago of the King and Pierce county Democratic organizations, both of which resulted in schisms and the selection of contesting delegations to the state convention, which will be held in Spokane May 17. The telegrams charged that the three federal officials were "parties to disgraceful proceedings at the King and Pierce

county conventions," and closed with the charge "these men seem to be desperate and have no regard for the high offices which they hold. The worst red has never been more lawless than these men."

The telegrams were signed by Charles D. Fullen, chairman of the King county Democratic committee; George E. Starr, King county Democratic state committee; State Chairman George Christensen, and A. H. Titlow, national committeeman. State Chairman Christensen announced tonight that tomorrow he would issue a call for a meeting in Spokane Sunday morning of the chairmen of the 39 county central committees "to discuss the seating of delegates."

In this connection, Mr. Christensen was quoted as saying that although the credentials committee of the convention and later the convention itself would pass on the seating of delegates, it was necessary that some arrangement be made for providing for the county representatives until permanent organization was perfected.

Earlier in the day Mr. Christensen had stated that it was not unlikely that two contesting state delegations would be sent to the national convention at San Francisco.
