A discussion of so timely a topic by an eminent authority, such as Mr. Taft, is considered an opportunity for Salem people.

Many plans are in progress to make Mr. Taft's stay in Salem as pleasant as possible. The Salem Commercial club is planning a luncheon at the Marion hotel in honor of the distinguished guest. Governor Olcott will be in charge of the introduction and the Salem Elks' orchestra will furnish music, both before and after the address of the evening.

Mr. Taft comes here under the management of the Ellison-White Lyceum bureau. Reserved seats are now on sale at Wells' music store and are much in demand.
