Night Accidents Fatal—
Eight fatalities, the largest number for a single week's report for many months, are listed in the report of the industrial accident commission for the week ending May 13. Two of the fatal cases, S. E. Willett and Frederick Peehler of Portland, resulted from the train collision at Bertha station last Sunday. The other fatalities are: Lester Ridge, Beaverton, chaser; William Linn, Portland, rigger; John O. Pumala, Quincy, logger; Milton A. Markham, Lakeside, logger; James E. Lee, Yamhill, sawyer; Nick Danreia, Clifton, trackman. The total number of accidents reported was 520 of which 482 were subject to the workmen's compensation act. Twenty-one were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act and 16 were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.

Educational Aid Act Applies Only in Oregon

If C. Maurice Meyers, whose home is at Corvallis, but who is in the naval service aboard the U. S. S. Melville, wants to go to college under the Oregon service men's educational aid act, he will have to return to his home state.

Myers has written Attorney General Brown asking if he can attend the University of California or the College of Hawaii and receive the financial benefits accorded Oregon service men under the act. The attorney general replies that the act limits the study courses to Oregon institutions.

Myers enlisted in the naval service in Portland June 15, 1917, and was overseas from June 1, 1918, until the armistice was signed. He will receive his discharge from the navy July 21, this year.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Morris Hillquit was elected international secretary of the party. Three international delegates elected were Algonson Lee, New York; James O'Neil, Brooklyn, and Joseph E. Cohn, Philadelphia.

The convention voted by acclamation to expunge from its records all matters pertaining to a resolution introduced in behalf of certain Cook county, Illinois delegates, which Hillquit said cast aspersions on the defense of the five socialist members expelled from the New York assembly.

"The wet and dry" issue threatened to bring down an avalanche of debate until motion by Cameron H. King, San Francisco, brought a vote to table a resolution to put the party on record as against "prohibitory amendments to the United States constitution."
