The sketches comprise his exhibit at the Central library in Portland last year, and are a pictorial diary of his trip to Germany and return. They are arranged in five groups. The first done in Canada; crossing the Atlantic; in England before leaving for France. The second consists of sketches done in the battle area while the war was on. The third group was done after his return to England in the spring of 1919. Sketches in the fourth division were made after the armistice in the march into Germany and during American occupation there. Division No. 5 shows Belgian and French scenes during the time he was billeted in Belgium awaiting his return to England.

Mr. Strickland made them all under the greatest difficulty; getting them past the censor, and even in procuring paper to sketch on. They are made on all sorts of material, salvaged from dug-outs, old ruins and German note books.
