Bridge Bids to be Opened by Highway Commissioners

Bids for the construction of several bridges will be opened by the state highway commission at a meeting in Portland on June 1. Four wood truss spans on Crooked river highway near Prineville in Crook county, will be included, requiring about 35 cubic yards of class "A" concrete, 520 yards of class "B" concrete, 9500 pounds of reinforced steel, 520 lineal feet of standard wooden trestle, two 120-foot wood truss spans, two 40-foot wood truss spans and 1000 cubic yards of excavation.

In Sherman county one combined crossing over Spanish gulch and the Shaniko branch of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation railroad on the Columbia River highway near Riggs is contemplated. It will require approximately 90 cubic yards of class "B" concrete, 230 lineal feet of standard wooden trestle, one 56-foot wood truss span and 300 cubic yards of excavation.

BOARD FAVORS SEPARATE CASE FOR THE WEST

Commissioner Williams May Attend Rate Hearing in Washington

COAST MUCH INTERESTED

Proposed General Horizontal Increase Is Severe on Pacific States

Because of the vast territory covered by the western classifications in the proposed general freight rate increases relative to which the interstate commerce commission will begin a hearing in Washington on May 24, it is strongly probable that the Oregon public service commission will contend for a separate hearing on western rates. This is according to statements made yesterday by Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the commission, and Fred A. Williams, one of the members, though they explained that the commission has not yet decided definitely what its contentions will be. The commission is now in communication with other western commissions relative to policy.

The Oregon commission will be represented at the Washington hearing.

Whether by a member of the commission or by an outside man has not been determined. Should a representative be sent from the commission, Mr. Williams doubtless will be the man.

A separate hearing, it is believed, would be feasible for western classifications because of the injustice suffered by the west through horizontal increases, since longer hauls and consequent bigger rate payments make increases strike much higher and harder in the west than in the east.

The railroads are seeking a return of 6 per cent on investment. In the western territory 185 and systems, operating 138,240 miles, are represented.

The investment is placed at \$8,963,882,573, upon which a return at 6 per cent would amount to \$537,832,924. In 1919 the net railway operating income, adjusted, was \$134,929,759. It is claimed, leaving a deficit below a 6 per cent return of \$352,893,265. If the increased revenue which is claimed is necessary is obtained by an increase in freight rates alone the required increase in the west would be 21.91 per cent.

Applying the proposed increase to freight rates alone the increase in eastern territory would be 10.43 per cent, or applying to total operating revenue would be 21.16 per cent. For the eastern territory the increase applying to freight rates alone the increase would be 30.95 per cent, or applying to total operating revenue, 20.759 per cent.

The variation in percentages among the three territories would not offset the condition whereby the west would be harder hit on a comparative basis than the east or the south.
