MARION COUNTY LOSES APPEAL

New Principle Is Established In Opinion by Court in Coates Case

The supreme court yesterday affirmed Judge P. R. Kelly of the lower court for Linn county in the action of J. L. Coates, as administratrix of the estate of F. L. Coates, vs. Marion county, appellant, an action for damages resulting from an accident on the Pacific highway which cost F. L. Coates his life. Coates was riding in an automobile which swerved on a bridge near Jefferson, Marion county, broke through the guard rail and caused injuries to Coates from which he died a few days later.

The case establishes the principle that the heirs or the administrators of the estates of persons accidentally killed may sue the county or the state.

PIES and PASTRIES

Plain Pastry
This recipe is for one large pie with top and bottom crust

Apple Pie
1 1/2 cups flour

2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon milk

Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add shortening and rub in very lightly; add just enough cold water to hold dough together. Roll half out on floured board. Line bottom of pie plate; fill in apples, which have been washed, pared and cut into thin slices; sprinkle with sugar; flavor with cinnamon or nutmeg; wet edges of crust with cold water; roll out remainder of pastry; cover pie, pressing edges tightly together and bake in moderate oven 35 minutes.

2 cups pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
