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THE JACOBIN CLUBS AT CHICAGO WILL FAIL

The Hi Johnson delegates from California to the Chicago convention are all millionaires, most of them many times millionaires, excepting three; and they possess more than a hundred thousand dollars each.

If all the delegates at Chicago averaged in wealth the average wealth of the Hi Johnson delegates from California, the Republican National Convention would be the most plutocratic body of men ever gathered under one roof in the world's history.

And yet this man Johnson is appealing elsewhere to voters as a poor man and the poor man's friend.

His delegates in the states with large foreign born populations are the minority selections of the men who hate America and everything American.

Here is the coup with which the Hearst-Johnson forces hope to coerce the Chicago convention into nominating Hiram for President:

As soon as the convention assembles Michigan avenue will be filled with thousands of radicals carrying Johnson banners, whooping for Johnson and demanding his nomination.

These Johnson demonstrations are already in process of organization.

Chicago contains a foreign population about equal to that of New York.

There is one Congress district in Chicago in which more than one-third of the population is of German birth or descent. Mayor Thompson is a Socialist who masquerades as a Republican. From such a combination a little organization will easily produce 50,000 shouters for Johnson. As Mayor Thompson controls the police force there will be no interference from that quarter unless actual rioting begins.

Delegates are to be besieged in their hotels and on the streets and told that the country demands the nomination of Johnson. Perhaps it was a mistake to hold the Republican National Convention in the city that would not receive Marshal Joffre and the French delegation during the war; that declined to extend an invitation to the King and Queen of Belgium to visit it; in which riots were threatened if they passed through the city on their way to the more patriotic and hospitable cities of the country; that re-elected a mayor who makes a boast of his Socialistic and pacifist beliefs.

But those familiar with national Republican conventions know that the Republican leaders are not children to be frightened by the hooting of owls and the barking of coyotes.

Some of the amateur Johnson boosters are fostering the delusion that Hiram will deliver a "cross-of-gold-and-crown-of-thorns" address from the platform of the convention and that it will be followed by a stampedede like that which gave Bryan his first nomination. But Johnson himself does not suffer from any such delusion. He tried that on the Republican convention of 1912, not once but three times. It was an even more impetuous Johnson than the Johnson of today; for he then carried more ideals and less fat; but he could not even keep his own California delegation intact. Johnson will not be a delegate; but it is an unwritten law of the convention that any candidate of recognized standing shall be permitted to address the convention if he desires.

As a barn-storming orator Johnson is a howling success.

He can arouse his own partisans to a frenzy.

But his biting sarcasm and contemptuous disregard for facts make little impression on men and women of equal or superior intellect.

Johnson failed to achieve even mediocre distinction in his Senate addresses. After two vain attempts early in his career, in which he became rattled by the heckling of the opposition, he subsided and took little part in the great treaty debates.

Johnson knows his own weakness.

He could secure a seat in the convention by directing that he be named as an alternate from the Fourth California district—for the California delegates are permitted by law to make their own selection of alternates.

There will be radical demonstrations along Michigan avenue and about the Coliseum building while the convention is in progress, but Johnson will not either sit in the convention or address the delegates while they are in session. Should he attempt to start any stampedede with personal oratory there will be a dozen able debaters and more learned parliamentarians willing and eager to meet him.

And the more the Hessians of American politics march in Chicago's streets, and the louder the Jacobin clubs of snarling and red radicals yell, the more adamant will be the determination of the assembled representatives of decency and Americanism to let the coyote yelps of the craven and disloyal elements in our politics rend the reverberant air in as vain an endeavor as that of the yellow dog in the back yard baying at the gibbous moon.

If you do not want to throw away your vote; if you want your vote to be worth anything for the good of your country and your world, cast it for Leonard Wood. Mr. Hoover does not want your vote, and a vote for Lowden is half a vote for Hi Johnson, the arch demagogue of American politics; the chiefest reactionary at present spewed up from the depths in American life, harking back to the pitiless and bloody past, and the fondest hope of all of America's enemies.

The liveliest place in Salem will be at the free auto camp.

Refinancing of King's Products Firm Begins

THE DALLES, Or., May 18.—(Special)—Reorganization and refinancing of the Kings Food Products company, operating dehydration plants in The Dalles, Salem and Portland was begun recently in this city when E. A. Clark, president; S. K. Eddy, director, and F. N. Clark, director, appeared before the chamber of commerce and outlined the plan.

The Portland interests represented by Messrs. Clark and Eddy agree to supply 70 per cent of the capital needed, some million dollars, while Salem and The Dalles are asked to contribute 15 per cent each. The plan was met with approval of the chamber of commerce which is back of the reorganization deal in every way. A committee will be appointed to float \$150,000 worth of preferred stock in this city.

KEELEY BARRED FROM PRACTICE

Supreme Court Opinion Denies Portland Lawyer Admission in Oregon

Le Roy E. Keeley's "general disposition is disclosed by his own evidence and his conduct and expressions at the investigation" rather than charges of improper, immoral and unprofessional conduct, form the basis of the supreme court's denial yesterday of Keeley's admission to the Oregon bar. The opinion is written by Justice Bennett.

Since Keeley has been practicing in the state by temporary permit, the supreme court allows him sufficient extension of time to complete his pending cases, but he is not allowed to enter into new litigation. The court's opinion is an outcome of objections made to Keeley's admission.

The extension of time allowed Keeley to complete his costs now in progress the court makes conditional upon his conducting the litigation with reasonable courtesy and respect toward the courts and members of the bar with whom he may come in contact.
