WOMEN'S CLUBS ASSEMBLE TODAY

County Federation Convenes in Salem, Five Cities Represented

The Marion County Federation of Women's clubs will be in convention at the club rooms of the Salem Woman's club in the Commercial club today. The delegates from the five federated city clubs of the county have arrived and will meet with the delegates from the two Salem Woman's clubs.

Miss Mattie Beatty, of the Salem Woman's club, who has acted in the capacity of chairman for the arrangements of the convention will preside. The first meeting will be at 10 o'clock this morning when the permanent organization will be effected. At noon the Salem Woman's club will be hostess to a luncheon to the delegates at the Hotel Marion.

The afternoon meeting has been called for 2 o'clock. Mrs. F. E. Buchanan, president of the Yamhill County Federation of Women's clubs will address the women on county federation and the excellent work that is accomplished through its organizations. Miss Ada Miller accompanied by Miss Dorothy Pearce will sing and Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian will address the meeting on the county library. It is urged by the president of the Woman's club, Mrs. Zadoc Riggs, that all of the club members in Salem attend the meetings and meet the visiting delegates. Officers will be elected at the afternoon meeting.

Delegates from the clubs at Astoria, Woodburn, Silverton, Willard and Jefferson will be in attendance. Five delegates from each club will form the official body.

Bonds Certified—When the secretary of state yesterday certified \$100,000 bonds for the Ochoo irrigation district of Crook county the total in bonds certified for that district reached a total of \$1,350,000. The district comprises 22,000 acres. A dam 125 feet high has been completed and water is now distributed on the project. The \$100,000 certified yesterday is for the purpose of completing construction.

Harold Howell in Salem
Short Time Yesterday

Harold Howell, 16 years old, who underwent three trials in Coos county on a charge of having slain Lillian Leuthold, and who was acquitted each time, was in Salem a short time yesterday on the way to Monmouth where he will pass the summer at the home of an uncle, John Howell. He was accompanied yesterday by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Howell. The latter, who suffered a severe injury of a hand some time ago in a Coos county mill, draws compensation from the state under the workman's compensation act and conferred with the commission yesterday.

Improvement Is Shown in Gasoline Situation
Under an agreement of state officials to waive administration of the law requiring a 56 degree specific gravity test for gasoline sold in the state, the Standard Oil company has informed Governor Olson that in a few days it will be able to allow a full requirement of fuel for industrial purposes, but not more than 80 per cent for pleasure cars. A cargo of fuel is expected from Portland May 25. The information received by the governor came in a letter from the district manager of the Standard Oil company in Portland.

Price Taken in North Dakota
Convict Who Escaped in Varney's Automobile Is Under Arrest

Jack Price, who with Robert Grant escaped from the state penitentiary March 27 last in an automobile belonging to State Parole Officer Varney, is under arrest at Rolla, N. D. Warden L. H. Compton was informed yesterday. Grant is still at large.

The charge on which Price is held at Rolla is not known here, and it is possible that the Oregon officers will allow him to remain in North Dakota for trial.

Price was sentenced from Umatilla county and received September 11, 1919, to serve up to five years for obtaining money by false pretenses. Grant, who escaped with Price, was received from Umatilla county September 14, 1919, to serve up to 10 years for larceny.

Clarence Guy, apparently his true name, for a coincidence of the escape was that on the same day the governor's office received a letter of inquiry from the man's mother in Kansas, who, under the impression that he had been released from prison, asked if he could be located. The officers here, however, did not know of the alias until some time afterward.
