

WOOD VICTORY IS PREDICTION

Tooze Believes State Generally Will Cast Ballot Against Johnson

Walter L. Tooze, Jr., who has for three months been organizing Leonard Wood clubs throughout western Oregon and who has just completed a whirlwind campaign with Hon. Montaville Flowers, from Ashland to Salem, makes the following statements as to the strength of the Republican candidates for the presidency:

over Hiram Johnson. Josephine and Polk counties will go 2 to 1 for Wood. Reports from Yamhill county indicate that Leonard Wood will now carry it by a large plurality, though two weeks ago this county was doubtful, due to the staunch support of Lowden adherents. the Oregon primaries—thus placing the principles of the party above and beyond his desire for office—have evoked the admiration of every Wood supporter in the state. His name, most unfortunately, will still remain on the ballot, as it could not legally be withdrawn after the filing of his petition. Therefore, some votes will still go to him contrary to his plainly expressed desire.

"The logical analysis of the situation from the viewpoint of any staunch Republican voter is clear and well defined. A vote for Hoover or Lowden is giving support to Hiram Johnson, and is of no value whatever to either Lowden or Hoover.

"Hiram Johnson does not represent on the league of nations covenant the well defined principles of the Republican party on this great question. A vote for Leonard Wood is a vote for one of the greatest American statesmen of the twentieth century, who, with his two sons, were the comrades of the 4,800,000 American sons who served in the great war. To vote for Hiram Johnson is to cast your ballot for a man who for eight long years has fought the Republican party and today refuses to stand with the overwhelming majority of Republican United States senators upon the great issue now before the American people, namely The League of Nations covenant.
