

NEW SECRETARY MAY BE NAMED WITHOUT DELAY

Balloting Was Decisive
Governor Doubtless Will
Appoint at Once

OLCOTT'S POWER CURBED
Close Contest Would Cause
Action to be Deferred
Until Canvass

If the successful candidate for secretary of state won by a decisive vote of his nearest competitor yesterday it doubtless will mean that Ben W. Olcott has sat for the last time in a state board of control meeting in a dual capacity as governor and as secretary of state. Should the vote on secretary of state be so close that the official canvass

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will be necessary to decide the winner to a certainty, then Mr. Olcott will once more sit with double voting power in a regular session of the board of control.

Governor Olcott announced last January that he would appoint as his successor in the secretary of state's office the candidate winning the Republican nomination in the May primary election.

Seven men are in the race which was decided by yesterday's votes. Should one of the candidates run so strong that his nomination is conceded by all of the other six there will be no reason for the governor holding up the appointment until the vote is officially canvassed by the secretary of state.

Should the vote be so close, however, that doubt would exist relative to the winner, then the governor will be expected to withhold appointment until doubt has been cleared by the official canvass.

Mr. Olcott would sit in the June meeting of the board of control both as governor and as secretary of state. Governor Olcott has held this unique position and power for more than a year, the first regular board meeting in which he sat in double role having been called on March 7, 1919, a few days after the death of Governor Withycombe. Mr. Olcott, as secretary of state, became governor under the constitutional order of succession. He has been entitled to the salaries of both of governor and secretary of state, but has not accepted the latter.

ADVICE GIVEN TO SOLDIERS

Red Cross Receives Bulletin
Relative to Compensation
for Service Men

The local chapter of the American Red Cross is in receipt of the following bulletin from headquarters and would like for every ex-service man affected by the bulletin to call at the local headquarters for further information.

"All soldiers having any form of disability incurred while in the service, which is not sufficiently marked to entitle them to compensation, should receive a certificate from the government, showing that such disability has been incurred.

"After July 1, ex-service men cannot apply for compensation unless such certificate has been granted by the government. Hence, all men are urged to send in to Washington, the information that they were injured in some way, and may, later, claim the right to compensation."

The following questionnaire accompanies the bulletin:

1. Mileage—(a) Did you receive 5 cents a mile when discharged? (b) Were you paid to your bona fide home at the time of your discharge?
2. Bonus—Did you receive the \$63 bonus?
3. Back pay—(a) Did you get all the money due you on discharge? (b) Were all allotments and allowances made by you received by the allottee? (c) Did you receive your clothing allowance? (d) Service pay? (e) All liberty bonds?
4. Insurance—(a) Has it lapsed? (b) Is it converted?
5. Compensation—(a) Are you now suffering from the effects of disease or injury received while in the service? (b) Is your claim filed? (c) Has an award been made? (d) Are you receiving the checks regularly? (e) Are you in need of medical treatment? (f) Are you receiving medical treatment?
6. Vocational training—(a) Are you vocationally handicapped? (b) Have you applied for training? (c) Has it been approved?
7. Employment—(a) Are you permanently employed? (b) Are you doing the work you are fitted for?
8. Are you of the opinion that you have something due from the government? If so, for what reason?
9. Do you know any service man entitled to government aid who is not getting it? If so, give name and address.
