

FARM LECTURE HEARD AT CLUB

R. A. Kroh Urges Movement
to Soil and Use of More
Modern Methods

R. A. Kroh of Akron, Ohio, spoke last night at the Commercial club auditorium before a very receptive audience on diversified farming, shortage of foodstuffs and farm labor, and the savings that a farmer can make by using motor driven farm equipment. Mr. Kroh is a very able speaker and the arguments he used last night were enough to convince the audience that steps must be taken by the people living in the

cities to co-operate with the farmers. Mr. Kroh pointed to the fact that Herbert Hoover was quoted in the papers as saying that the United States was faced by the necessity of importing foodstuffs from Europe in the near future unless something is done to increase the supply to meet the demand. That farming has gone out of date was proved by Mr. Kroh when he gave the figures on the number of people who were living on farms in 1880 and 1890 and at present. Seventy per cent of the population of the nation were occupied at farming, and the remaining 30 per cent were living in the cities at that time, says Mr. Kroh, but at present only 30 per cent of the population is occupied at farming, thus tending the non-producers so far to outnumber the producers that the law of supply and demand is overbalanced.

Food made it possible for the allies to win the World war from Germany, Mr. Kroh said, and now that 60 per cent of the land formerly used in the European countries for growing grain is useless on account of lying in the devastated area, it is up to the United States to supply enough commodities for its own use and also for exportation.

"And that means that the farmer will be called on to produce more, and as there is a shortage of farm labor the farmer should use the most up-to-date motor driven farm equipment, which will not only do more work than will horse-driven equipment, but will save money and labor for the farmer as well," the speaker declared.

Mr. Kroh also preaches the doctrine of diversified farming. He says that every farmer should have a few cows, chickens and hogs on his ranch and that he should rotate his crops to get the most out of the land. The most important thing, Mr. Kroh says, is to be sure there is a market for the thing produced, and he asserts that with the increase of prices there will not be a market for the luxuries of life very long.

Diversified farming, declares Mr. Kroh, will keep the farmer occupied the year round and will not only in-

crease production but will cut down expenses as well. The subject of drainage was taken up, and Mr. Kroh expressed a desire to return to Marion county after the crops are harvested and lend his aid in having a drainage bill passed by the legislature, such as the state of Iowa has at present and which is proving satisfactory.

In the fifth, four hits and two errors brought in five more runs and in the sixth, four hits accounted for six runs. At the request of the visitors the slaughter was stopped and everybody went home.

Friday S. H. S. goes to Jefferson for a return game. Salem won from Jefferson here, 6 to 2.

Yesterday's game marks Salem's sixth victory in eight games. The two games lost were just kicked into the "lost column" through errors.

As a team the high schoolers are pounding the ball for a grand average of .297—a good batting average for any player, let alone a team. The opponents have now amassed the batting average of .120 which shows with what effectiveness the local pitchers are working and also how well the high school fielders are choking off the base hits.

LAWYER WINS IN LITIGATION

Perfectly All Right for Him
to Have Fee for Lobbying,
Says Opinion

Whether Samuel Herrick, an attorney of Washington, D. C., can collect a fee for lobbying in congress in behalf of an Oregon client is the question involved in the case of Herrick vs. Charles W. Barzee, which was decided yesterday by the supreme court. In reversing a decree of Judge W. N. Gates of Portland, Justice Bean holds that the attorney's claim is legitimate. Justice Bennett wrote a dissenting opinion. Barzee took a homestead near The Dalles. Later he found that the land had been granted to The Dalles military road and was not subject to entry. By cancellation of his claim he lost improvements valued at \$1900 and employed Herrick to present his claim before congress. The claim was allowed in 1916 by special act of congress. Herrick sued to collect a fee of five per cent of the amount of the claim, as agreed upon, and Barzee entered a contest against the attorney's claim, alleging among other things that the contract had not been fulfilled within stipulated time. On grounds that the attorney had lobbied against public policy Judge Gates threw the case out of court. Justice Bean holds that the contract was legitimate and the claim not unlawful.

Other opinions were handed down as follows:

M. M. Gearin vs. Rothchild Bros., appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; controversy over lease. Opinion by Justice John. Judge Robert Tucker affirmed.

L. S. Whetstone vs. Jene Jensen, appellant; appeal from Lane county; action to recover money. Opinion by Chief Justice McBride. Judge G. F. Skipworth affirmed.

C. J. Allen vs. B. L. Magill, ap-

pellant; appeal from Wallowa county; suit to enjoin defendant from diverting water. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge J. W. Knowles affirmed.

Alaska Junk Company vs. S. Stein, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; suit to recover \$37.50. Opinion by Justice Harris. Judge W. M. Gates reversed and case remanded. Marion T. Chance, et al., appellants, vs. Edward Weston, et al.; appeal from Tillamook county. Opinion by Justice Bean. Decree of Judge George R. Bagley modified.

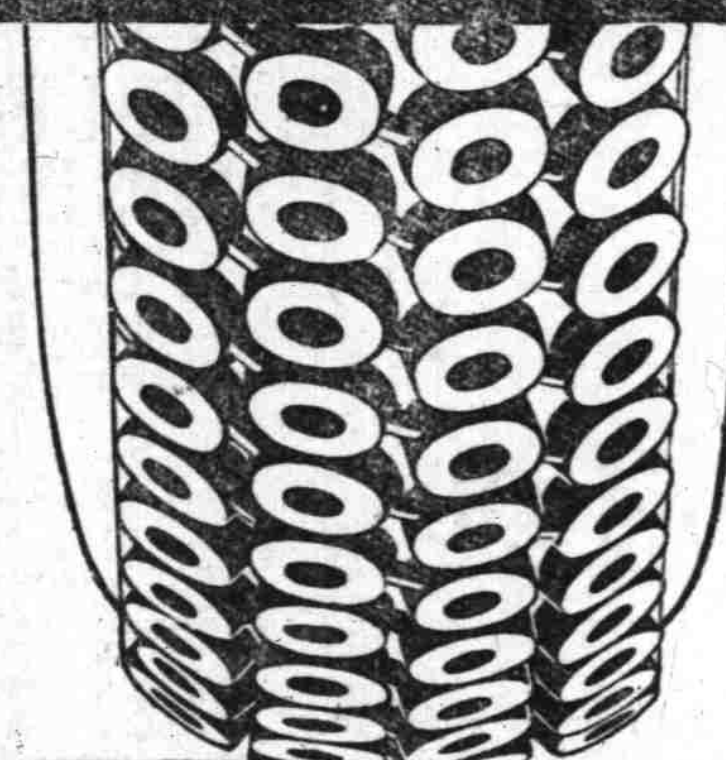
