Copper to Medford.—Percy A. Copper, state engineer, left last night for Medford and will inspect several irrigation projects in southern Oregon. Efforts are being made to organize a new district at Sulphur, Douglas county, and Mr. Copper will give his assistance. He will inspect the Medford irrigation district, which has entered into a contract with Pat Welch of Spokane for construction of the project. The district represents about \$1,250,000. Other districts to be inspected by Mr. Copper are the Talent, Eagle Point and Grants Pass districts.
