with the state honours outitting the Triangle boys by gleaming four hits off Bishop, while the "Y" netted but two off of the offerings of Hugh Webb, the state house slab artist. The "Y" were charged with three errors while the state house tribe contributed but one misplay to the error column.

Both Webb and Bishop twirled A-1 ball for their clubs, both getting nine strikeouts. Webb walked two men while Bishop, by his superb control, did not issue a free pass. The game was virtually a pitchers' battle and by far the most exciting and tightly played to date in the present Twilight series. Some high-class officiating by Johnny Humphreys contributed materially to the high class of ball played, and not a kick was voiced at the manner in which Johnny looked 'em over.

The "Y" broke into the scoring calcium first when Howell drew a pass with two hands down, stole second, and on an attempted steal of third scored when Gabrielsen heaved one over third into left field. The Triangular tribe annexed another run in the fourth frame when Adolph walked, stole second and scored on Osborne's double to left. This ended the scoring for the "Y".

The state house opened up in its half of the fourth inning when Small singled and stole second, romping home when Unruh overthrew second. Schneider was made a present of the first sack by a bit of slow fielding, and stole second, later going to third on Gabrielsen's out, and scoring on Knickerbocker's double to left field. Glazier whiffed, ending the inning and the state house scoring-bee.

Features of the game were a running catch by Schneider in the second canto, and Patterson's capture of a high foul off the fence. Unruh and Gabrielsen both caught snappy games, both pegging to the bases in good style. A few more games of the type staged in last night's game will insure the success and popularity of the Cherry City Twilight league which, under the presidency of Jim Elvin, has a flying start and a bright future. The largest crowd of the season lined out for last evening's battle, in spite of threatening weather.

Friday night the Spaulding Loggers and the Valley Motorists will tangle on Sweetland field, and ac-
