Copper Does Not Think Bill Meets Requirements

The World war farm and home building act, a bill introduced by Senator Borah of Idaho, providing an appropriation of \$300,000,000 and designed to provide farms and suburban homes for ex-service men, from the point of view of irrigation, will not accomplish the purpose of the Western States Reclamation association, in the opinion of Percy A. Copper, state engineer and member of the executive committee of the association. Mr. Copper criticizes the measure in a letter to Governor D. W. Davis of Idaho, chairman of the association.

While Mr. Copper thinks the general features of the bill should receive the association's support, he does not believe the association should consider its work done if the bill is enacted into law.

PROSPECTORS HUNT RUM.

THE PAS, Man. Man 26.—Ten cases of rum which, an Indian tradition says, were buried at Cumberland house a century and a half ago, were being searched for today by a party of prospectors. The story is that the rum was brought into the north by a French trading party, which was stopped and turned back by the Hudson Bay people after they had hidden the liquor which was intended for the Indian trade.

RUSSIAN GOLD ARRIVES.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 26.—Gold valued at \$12,000,000, brought here Monday from Hongkong in the steamship Empress of Russia, has been shipped to San Francisco under heavy guard. The money was Russian funds that had been kept in vaults of Hongkong banks for three years. The liner also brought 630 tons of silk.

Fare Increase Is Again Asked by Street Railway

Following defeat in the Portland special city election last Friday of measures designed to relieve the Portland Railway Light & Power company of specified burdens of annual expense, the company yesterday filed with the public service commission a new application for relief from decreasing returns on its investment. The company asks an increase in fares.

Whether the public service commission will call a new hearing for investigation of allegations in the new application, or issue an order on the basis of data and exhibits already at hand from the previous hearing, will be determined in the next day or two. The previous opinion of the service commission, issued March 23, held the issue open in such a way that the commission could at any time make another order without further hearing.

Breaks Auto Wheel; Motorist Speeds On

R. W. Balleystine of West Salem, reported to the police late last night, that some one had run into his automobile and had broken off a front wheel. Mr. Balleystine said that he had parked the car in front of a local church while attending services and that shortly after entering the building heard a crash. Upon going out to investigate saw an automobile disappearing down the street at a high rate of speed.

NEW YORK, May 26.—Frederic Beach Jennings, member of the law firm of Stetson, Jennings & Russell, died at his home here today. He was stricken last Sunday by what was described as a sort of paralytic stroke.
